Markets.

Toronto Markets.

"CANADA FARMER" Office, Feb. 1st, 1868.

The produce market has been dull and without much animation during the past week. Very few lots of either flour or grain have changed hands, and prices are, therefore, to a great extent nominal.

Flour—Market very dull. No 1 super held firmly at \$7, with, however, no buyers at over \$6.85 and \$6.90. Few or no sales have been reported during the past week.

Wheat—The receipts continue large; there is, however, very little animation in the market. For spring wheat buyers will not give over \$1.58 to \$1.60, holders are asking \$1.63, and even higher, and fall wheat is held at \$1.60, with no sales at these figures. A car sold to day at \$1.73 at N.R.R. depot. On the street market \$1.76 to \$1.79 is paid for choice loads.

Oats—Receipts are light and prices have advanced. No car lots are changing hands; on the street as high as 64c was paid to-day for a load of choice; good loads sell readily at from 60c to 62c. **Barley**—The market remains steady and unchanged. A few car lots sold during the week at \$1.05; on the street market from \$1 to \$1.03 has been paid.

Peas—Market firm. A sale was made to-day of three cars at 80c on cars at Guelph; prices here have ranged from 76c to 78c.

Rye—A few loads on the street market brought \$1 per 56 lb.

Oatmeal—A few lots offering at equal to \$0.60 here. Other lots held higher.

Pork—The supply of Mess is light and not equal to demand. Holders are firm at \$18 and \$19.50. Prime mess held at \$14 with little in the market.

Cut Meats—In full supply. Holders are firm at quotations. Shoulders, 6½c. Hams in salt, 8½c to 9c. Cumberland cut, boxed, 7½c.

Lard—A few sales at 9½c.

Cheese—Market very dull; lots difficult to move at 10c to 10½c.

Eggs—In bbls, 17c; on the market 18c to 20c.

Butter—No 1 dairy selling at 18c to 18½c; store-packed difficult of sale. Holders ask 14c. Rolls on the market 20c.

Dressed Hogs—The receipts have slightly diminished. Packers are, however, still well stocked. A few car loads, light weight are offering at \$5.60. Good heavy hogs, averaging 200 lbs, would bring as high as \$6.50.

Hops—The following are the current selling rates in this market: Inferior, per lb, 25c to 30c; Medium, 30c to 35c; Good, 35c to 45c; Fancy, 45c to 50c.

HIDES AND SKINS.

There is the usual demand at full prices, with very little stock in market:—Hides, green, rough, per lb, 6c; do green, salted and inspected, 7½c; do cured, 8½c. Calfskins, green, 10c; do cured, 12½c; do dry, 15c to 20c; Sheepskins, 70c to 75c; Pelts, 70c to 75c.

THE CATTLE MARKET.

There has been a plentiful supply of first-class cattle during the week. The lots offering were purchased freely by the Toronto butchers, and drovers for the Toronto and Montreal markets, at about \$7 to \$7.50, per 100 lbs dressed weight. Second class brought from \$5.50 to \$6. Inferior—none offering, farmers preferring to feed than sell at the low prices current for the inferior grades. Sheep and lambs have been very plentiful during the week; 1st class sheep bring from \$4 to \$5; 2nd class brought from \$3.50 to \$3.75; 3rd class, \$2.50 to \$3. The tendency of the market for sheep is rather downwards. Calves have been in demand at from \$4 to \$5 each.

Welland Canal superfine, \$7.40 to \$7.50; Superfine No. 1 Canada wheat, \$7.40 to \$7.50; Superfine No. 1 Western wheat, \$7.40 to \$7.50; Superfine No. 2 Western wheat, \$7 to \$7.20; Bag flour, per 100 lbs, \$3.50 to \$3.65. **Wheat**.—Canada Fall, none, spring, \$1.67½ to \$1.70; western, \$1.62½. **Oats**.—Per 32 lbs, 45c to 47c. **Barley**.—49 lbs, 90c to \$1. **Butter**.—Dairy, 16c to 18c; store-packed, 14c to 16c. **Ashe**.—Pots, \$5.22½; to \$5.27½; pearls, \$5.80. **Pork**.—Mess, \$19 to \$19.25; prime mess, \$14; prime, \$13. **Dressed Hogs**.—\$3.50 to \$6. **Peas**.—55c to 80c. **Rye flour**.—none.
