

amount of personal comfort; but simply moderate enjoyment and a respite from harassing care. Threatened with debt—debt which it is literally difficult to avoid incurring, in some instances, for what is merely to cover and sustain and nourish the body—how can they be otherwise than harassed with care? And there of course should bear the Cross, prepared likewise to report to us the Crown?

"Is everything that brings a real increase of happiness and comfort?" his parishioners the clergymen will rejoice—but—parochioners ought to give him credit for a disinterested joy indeed, when what has contributed to their good fortune has added to his weakness; and when it thus often happens that he bears, with a sorely aching heart, glowing accounts of a prosperity and a progress which have been enriching others indeed, but have just been scattering a few drops of temporal tribulation round his household hearth."

The Clergy in the United States are suffering neutrally, we are grieved to see, in this respect; and so England too our brethren have not escaped. At a large public dinner of the Clergy Society in Bristol, the Bishop of Gloucester made the following remarks:

"There were many among the clergy—all indeed who depended on a fixed income, Curates and Bishops—so whom the increasing prosperity of the nation was it is right to allow the expression, a positive diminution from their income. It meant that if matters went on as now, with prices rising, commercial enterprise increasing, and all growing rich around them, those who had only a fixed income would not remain as they were, but proportionally fall in the scale of society. They would have their £100 or £120 a. l., but that £100 or £120 would not buy them what they got them a year back. And there seemed no reason to suppose that their income would increase in proportion with the rise of prices which had occurred."

ITEMS.

The Montreal D. C. Society held its anniversary on 1st Jan., the Lord Bishop in the Chair. Income for the last year £447, besides that of the Widows and Orphans fund, £238. Local subscriptions, for local uses, expended in the various Parishes, £8,161 being an increase over the preceding year of £2,111.—(We do not clearly understand this. Does it include all contributions in the Parishes in support of the Clergy, &c.?) The S. P. G. resolved to grant £3,000 annually for the payment of Missaries, from 1st July last to 1st July, 1854, after which, it will be reduced not less than 10 per cent.

The income of the Quebec D. C. S. for six months past, was £685. Expended properly of the Society for general purposes £1,301 10. Two Widows and Orphans' fund amounts £1,750, besides £131 in interest. We hope to-morrow soon be able to assure that the miserable atom as yet called by one of that fund amongst ourselves, has been up to something like the proportions attained by other Societies.

EXTRACT from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Governors of King's College, on the 10th January 1854.

"Her Majesty's assent having been given to the Bill passed in the Session of the Provincial Legislature held in the year 1853, entitled "An Act to incorporate the Governors of King's College, at Windsor, and to repeal the Act for founding, establishing, and maintaining a College in this Province"—Resolved, That the Secretary do write to the President of the 'Alumni of King's College, Windsor,' and request that he will call a GENERAL MEETING of the Alumni, for the election of persons to be Governors of the College, with their names in Second Section of the Act as required by the said Act, and to inform the Secretary when such Governors are elected, in order that the present Board may take measures to transfer the government and funds of the College to the new Board of Governors.

In pursuance of the above, A SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING of the Alumni of King's College, for the purpose of electing persons to be Governors of the College, will be held on Friday the 10th day of February next, at 12 o'clock, in the National School Room, at Halifax.

For the guidance of the members the following Section of the Act and By-Laws are published, to which reference attention is requested.

"II. Section of the Act to incorporate the Alumni of King's College, Windsor—"And by Special Act, That all persons paying an annual subscription of Twenty Shillings or upwards or making at one time a donation of Twenty Pounds or upwards, shall be entitled to be members of the Incorporated Alumni, having been duly admitted pursuant to the By-Laws thereto."

"V. By-Laws of the Alumni of King's College:—"That at this meeting members not present may vote by proxy in writing, to be held by any other member; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote either personally or by proxy whose dues are not all paid up for the preceding year."
