CANADIAN GRAIN SALES

Question No. 1,396-Mr. Skoberg:

- 1. How many brokerage firms are now handling Canadian grain sales?
 - 2. Where are these firms located?
- 3. In the event of one brokerage firm handling a grain sale, do any or all of the other firms receive any remuneration as well?
- 4. How much per bushel do the brokerage firms receive for handling Canadian grain sales?
- 5. How are the charges determined?
- 6. At any time, did ships refuse to enter the Vancouver port for grain until they received an additional payment per bushel and, if so (a) how much per bushel did they receive (b) was this cost passed on to the producer?

Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister without Portfolio): It is assumed that the question refers to shipping and exporting firms acting as agents for the Canadian Wheat Board. On this assumption, the answers are as follows: 1 and 2. See list attached.

- 3, 4 and 5. The Canadian Wheat Board does not pay a remuneration to these firms for negotiating Canadian grain sales. Competition establishes the margin which can be added to the Board's price.
- 6. The Canadian Wheat Board is not involved in the negotiations between its agents and the vessel owners. If such additional cost were incurred it was not claimed against the Canadian Wheat Board nor passed to the producer.
