I have gone over the suggested course for graduate study and think it is quite all right. Cameron had a talk with me about this some time ago and I told him I did not think it would be wise to undertake an organization for formal lectures, but he assured me that the teaching would be carried on by seminars and that it would not interfere seriously with his time; and further, that the progress of research, by the extra work we would thus be able to do, would more than compensate for his loss of time. You are at liberty therefore, so far as I am concerned, to go ahead with the plan. I was pleased to see what I thought was a better temper on the part of Conklin. I hope from now on things will run smoothly between him and Cameron. The more I see of Cameron, the more I am impressed with his good sense and wisdom.
