Each piano was judged as to Tone, Quality, Reputity and Touch, the highest figure in each being the lowest 1. Each Judge made his figures on those points, and these figures were really the fundamental basis of all the accords, the corner-stone on which they all rest. All makers who reached in each point figure 3 and unwards received an award, and all below received nothing. Thus it will be seen the highest possible humber for any instrument to reach would be 96, while those reaching 48, and upwards, would receive a medal."


