YALE SWEEP CARD AT NEW LONDON

Trimmed Harvard in All Events at Inter-College Meet—Rough Water.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 25.—For the first time in many years Yale University crews swept the river in the annual dual regatta with Harvard, and tonight the Alumn and under-graduates are cheering their three crews and Coach Guy Nickalls until the din is deafening. Notwithstanding delays, due to rough water and accidents, the English coach-boat determination fought for victory from early forenoon until dark, defeat in turn the Junior, Varsity and freshman eights of the crimson.

Victory was exceedingly sweet to the crew of the inter-varsity regatta records have to be searched for many years to find a Yale triple victory, all the more Harvard successes are of frequent and recent occurrence. To add to the joy of the blue the Varsity eight established a new up-stream course record in winning the big race, which is likely to stand for years.

Fully 10,000 spectators witnessed the contests from the observance area which followed each race, along the banks of the Thames, while the river shores were populated by throngs ranging from hundreds to thousands at every point of vantage.

Chief interest centred in the outcome of the four-mile Varsity race, when the Yale outscum demonstrated that the eight victory of last year's English-coached crew was not a fluke by winning today's contest by almost six lengths. Yale's time, 8 minutes, 5 seconds, Harvard 21:13.4.

The freshman race, rowed in semi-darkness over a mile and a half course, was won by the Yale first year crew by approximately one length, the three being: Yale 8 minutes, 5 seconds; Harvard, 8 minutes 10 seconds.

The Junior rowed this forenoon, was won by Yale by three-quarters of a length. The time was Yale 10:44, Harvard 10:43.
