

CHAPTERS VI. & VII.

[The two last chapters "Euthanasia for the Sick Man" and "What Will Hinder?" are of small interest. In "Euthanasia for the Sick Man" it is contended Russia ought to have Constantinople, and we doubt if a better arrangement could be made, if England should be willing and be able to adopt the Indian policy of our author, which is wiser than his policy in dealing with the colonies. In "What Will Hinder?" he contends that any opposition in Victoria, New South Wales, or the Cape Colony must give way "once the thing has been decisively done." Of course the same thing would be said of Canada, and we are not prepared either to give up our Crown lands or our voice in regard to our future. Nor is it easy to think the "splendour-loving nature" of Mr. Disraeli will be ready to compel the people of Victoria to place their Crown lands in the hands of a body of 450 men in London, 350 of whom would be elected by the United Kingdom, and the majority of the balance from various parts of the world.]
