

PRINCIPAL ANIMALS ON THE CONTINENT OF AMERICA.

EXAMINATION LESSON XVI.

North America.

Q. Point out and name the principal animals on the Continent of America, as shown in the engraving.

A. 1, the Wolf; 2, Fox; 3, Otter; 4, Bear; 5, Moose; 6, Llama; 7, Buffalo (or, more correctly, the Bison); 8, 9, Beaver; 10, Wild Horse; 11, Condor; 12, Alligator.

Q. Trace on the map the trip just made.

Q. Point out on the map the boundaries of North America.

Q. Point out and name the chief divisions of North America.

A. Greenland, or Danish [day-nish] America; Russian [rush-an] America; British America; the United States; Mexico; Central America; and the West-India Islands.

Q. Point out and name the great mountain-ranges in North America.

A. The Rocky Mountains, on the Pacific coast; and the Alleghany [al-lĕ-gay-nĕ] Mountains, on the Atlantic coast.

Q. Point out and name the principal lakes.

A. Ontario, Erie, Huron, Michigan [mish-

ë-gan'], Superior, Winnipeg, Ath-ă-bas-că, Great Slave, and Great-Bear Lakes.

Q. Point out and name the great rivers.

A. The St. Lawrence to the east, the Mississippi to the south, and the Mackenzie to the north.

Q. Point out and name the other principal rivers.

A. Ottawa, Ohio, Rio Gran-de, Missouri, Saskatehewan, Columbia, and Kwiekpaek.

Q. Point out and name the oceans.

A. The Atlantic, Pacific, and Arctic Occans.

Q. Point out and name the great bays at the north.

A. Baffin's and Hudson Bays.

Q. Point out and name the principal gulfs.

A. St. Lawrence, Mexico, and California.

Q. Point out and name the principal straits.

A. Davis, Belle-Isle, and Yu-că-tan Channel, along the east coast.

Q. Point out and name the principal islands.

A. Parry, Melville; Banks, Albert, and Victoria Land; Booth-i-ä, Cockburn [ko-burn], Cumberland, and Southampton, at the north; Newfoundland, Cape Bret-on, Long Island; the the V
