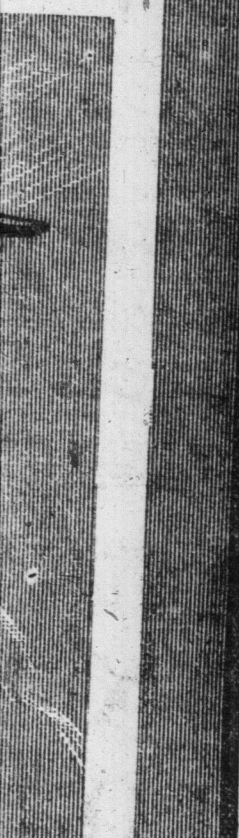

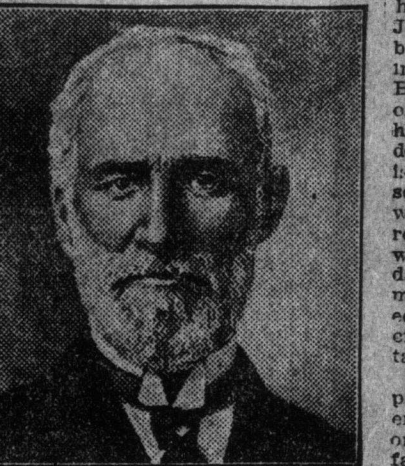

Pill Merchant Is Back of a Fight Syndicate

Joseph Beecham Is to Supply \$125,000 for Boxing Arena in London, Which Will Seat 17,000 People, and Will Cater to the English Masses.

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Undaunted by the cold blanket put on the boxing game in this country by the action of the home office in stopping the Wells-Johnson fight and subsequent action in several parts of the country, Joseph Beecham, famous as the manufacturer of pills, has decided to risk some of his money in an effort to uplift the downtrodden profession. Mr. Beecham is to have nothing to do with the scheme in a direct way except that he will supply the golden sovereigns. The real manager is L. Delphin, a Swiss, who married one of the pill merchant's daughters. He has evolved one of the most pretentious schemes ever launched in English athletic and amusement circles and it has already assumed tangible form.

An enormous hall with a seating capacity of more than 17,000 is to be erected immediately in Euston-road, one of the main thoroughfares of London, facing the Victoria station, the King's Cross and the Euston railway stations and connected by bus, underground and tram with practically every part of London and the suburbs. For this building Beecham is to supply something like \$125,000 capital, and so sanguine is Delphin and those associated with him in the scheme, that they are confident of paying at least 100 per cent. per annum on this big investment. This is to be accomplished in the following manner:

For the newly the new hall is to be used for boxing contests. The schemes have gone so far that they have already opened negotiations with the top-dogs in the flat world—boys like Clenchman, the Frenchman, Jimmy Clabby, Johnny Coulton, Digby Stanley, Jim Driscoll, Owen Moran, Matt Wells, Packey McFarland, and Bombarde Billy Wells. These men are being offered purses that far outbid anything the National Sporting Club is willing to offer, and the chances are that most of them will be induced to journey to London and make their appearances in the new hall.

There will be no attempt made to get high prices for seats, as those who prize it is hoped to get crowds of experience in London of Hugh McIntosh and James White, that trying to promote boxing matches for the English "classes" is a game of financial suicide. In the proposed hall the best seats will sell for 50 cents and the cheapest for 12 cents. With these prices it is hoped to get crowds of 6000 boxing enthusiasts to witness the more important battles and perhaps 2000 to sit thru the novice competitions that will be staged when the big fight-ers are available.

Wrestling matches will also be put on and it is the present intention of the promoters to run an international tournament in which the best wrestlers on this side of the water will be pitted against each other in an effort to find a man capable of lowering the colors of Frank Gotch.

Present Day Fighters Lacking in Footwork

Those who regularly attend the boxing shows of to-day cannot have failed to notice one fact in connection with the modern glove artists. They all lack what is known as footwork. They have never been taught the art of stepping in and stepping back, which is used to form the foundation or basis of the instruction in boxing as taught by the old-time professors, such men as Mike Donovan, Billy McLean, Johnny Clarke, Bobby Colbert and others of that school.

It is this lack of footwork which for the most part produces so much clinching and hugging in the boxing contests. The men are eager to get into close quarters, and they step in fast enough, but there their cleverness of foot stops, for they do not know how to get away, and they clinch and hold until they are separated by the official. Now, a man who has been taught proper footwork can step in and step back in such a way that it is sure that his opponent will be able to grab and hold him. It is a dangerous business to step in and clinch with a man who can hit hard and is quick on his feet. It is the proper play with such a man to keep just beyond his reach.

In the days of Young Griffo, that clever boxer, or his compatriot, Jack McAuliffe, Charley McKeever, George Dixon, Joe Walcott, or any one of a dozen boxers who knew how to use their feet, asked nothing better than to have a man rush into close quarters with them. Griffo especially would set himself for such a man, and before he could get away would land half a dozen punches that would out the rusher to ribbons. Then Griffo would get out of reach and the bad boxer, who had been a punching bag for him, would be "up in the air." The majority of the younger generation of boxers seem to be able to step in well enough, but then they anchor and come to a clinch, and this fault makes many of them second raters, who, if they could use their feet as well as they do their hands, would be top-notchers.
