There were over 300 persons, including a number of women, in the room, with a crowd standing outside waiting the opportunity to get in. Over 490 umbrellas were sold off in bundles of 6 and 8 fetching from 50c to \$3 per bundle.

Dozens of suit cases, trunks, large and small, some of imitation leather, and some of real good quality, in fact, very kind and quality imaginable were put up for sale. These sold from 65c to \$10. Snowshoes, clocks, a couple of guitars, chairs, hammocks, tools, bicycles, and numbers of other articles were disposed of. One young man, altho he didn't know it at the time, purcha ed a brand new suit of excellent quality serge for a one dollar bill. From 11.30 to 11.35 business ceased in memory of C. M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk. Every man in the room during this five minutes stood with bared head and, in compliance with Mr. Henderson's request. no sound was made.


