Joseph Short Succumbed to Gas Poisoning and Mrs. Short is in Hospital.

Joseph Short, 6 St. Andrew's street, was found dead in bed at 4.30 yesterday afternoon and his wife lying unconscious beside him from the effects of gas poisoning. The body of the man was removed to the morgue. An inquest will likely be held. A defective gas jet was responsible for the leakage.

ALL RAILWAYS HAVE PILES OF SLACK COAL

Fuel Controller Has Many Messages Telling of Hoarding.

A large pile of snowed-in coal alongside the C.P.R. tracks on the old Government House property at the corner of King and Simco streets has attracted the attention of numerous passers-by lately. That some people have been fully appreciative of its value for fuel purposes is demonstrated by the fact that wagon tracks lead to and from the hummocks of coal. This pile covers a length of several hundred yards. Railway sidings all over the city have piles of this coal alongside them. It is mostly slack coal or a very cheap grade of soft coal, not suitable for ordinary heating purposes. Nevertheless people are continually notifying the fuel controller's office that they have discovered that somebody is hoarding coal here or there. In one case a message came to the fuel controller and reports were published in some of the newspapers that the Royal Flying Corps had several hundred tons of coal at Hayden House. An investigation brought out the fact that there was only 50 tons in the pile, just enough to finish out the winter, and that the coal was not of the kind used for domestic heating.

BARRELS OF APPLES.

Hundred and Fifty Thousand of Them in Annapolis Valley.

Halifax, Feb. 8.—G. H. Vroom, chief fruit inspector, announces that there are one hundred and fifty thousand barrels of apples still in the Annapolis Valley. The English market for these is entirely cut off and the western markets cannot be reached to any great extent on account of transportation conditions.
