Gloucester, Mass., Aug. 16.—Capt. Swin of the schooner Mariner, which arrived today, reports that on July 10 he picked up a bottle which contained a note signed "Schooner Falcon." The note stated that the cable and rudder were gone, that two men had been washed overboard and that the vessel was sinking. The note had no date. The schooners Falcon and John W. Bray sailed from this port last November and have never been heard from. This confirms the opinion that they and their crews were lost in a heavy gale during that month.
