The World's Greatest Cricketer.

The fifty-first birthday of Dr. W. G. Grace, champion cricketer of the world, was celebrated yesterday all over England and wherever cricket is played in the civilized world. Grace was born on July 18, 1848, and in 1864 he first played cricket. In 1865 he was chosen to assist the Gentlemen against the Players at Lord's and at the Oval. Grace began his long list of centuries in first-class matches in 1866 by making 224, not out, for England against Survey, after going in at the fall of the fifth wicket.
