How George Orton Lost.

Reports of the English amateur athletic championships held in London last week received in this country. They speak of the defeat of George W. Orton of Toronto in the two-mile steeplechase. Orton won the event in hollow style last year, and returned to England on purpose to defend his title.

Two years ago, when he was victorious, he was the only competitor able to clear the water jump, and this gave him the advantage of seeing the whole distance dry.

Orton depended greatly on his ability to jump. It appears that the local committee in charge of the championships, which were held on the Moleague grounds, Wolsingham, discounted his chance by making the water jump too stiff for even the peerless Canadian steeplechaser to negotiate.

W. Stokes of the Birchfield Harriers profited by the transformation of the course into a cross-country one. He led all the way, with Orton as his attendant for the first mile. Then the latter was passed by the Harriers and by H. G. L. Lloyd of the Thames Harrier and H. H. H. Orton finished fourth, with three other competitors behind him. The time for the two miles was 11 minutes 45 seconds.

No Longer Columbus.

PEOPLE'S HEADS IN DANGER

Ald. Findlay Thinks Too Much is Being Paid to Civic Employees.

Could Be Run Under One Head, He Thinks—A Lot of Objections—General City News.

Hamilton, July 18.—(Special.)—The members of the Special Investigating Committee of the City Council, being fond of work, had a meeting this evening to look into the management of the Waterworks and Tax Departments. The committee was organized to admit the report. Ald. Findlay was in the chair, and after outlining the objects of the meeting informed the members that \$8000 was spent yearly in salaries in the two departments, and in his opinion, the salaries should be \$4000 less than that sum.

Before the committee got down to work, Ald. Ten Eyck wanted to know what was going to be done with the former Street Commissioner, MacLennan. The office had been cut out of the budget, and he suggested that MacLennan be made assistant to Engineer Wiggins, as the latter had said he would require an assistant.

The matter dropped when Ald. Findlay remarked that it would be time to appoint an assistant when Mr. Wiggins asked for one.

One Head Would Do.

Turning to the object of the meeting, Chairman Findlay said that the two departments could be managed by one head with about four clerks.

Ald. Macdonald stated that there were now 11 men occupied chiefly in taking money and giving receipts. The system was out of date and needed immediate reformation.

Ald. Findlay and Ten Eyck moved to have a sub-committee appointed to investigate the workings of the departments, but the committee would not agree to having the task shunted off in that way.

In the discussion that followed, objections were made to various members of the staff, and it was finally agreed that a new and better system was wanted. Dame, the City Auditor will be asked to meet the committee and give his opinion on the methods best suited to the department's needs.

City Messenger's Salary Too High.

The committee took up the city messenger's salary, which it was stated was \$102 a year. It was considered far too high, and the committee concluded that the office should be abolished.
