## REPUBLICANS GAINED OUTSIDE.

Nash is Safe in Ohio, and Republicans Gained Assemblymen in New Jersey.

New York, Nov. 8.—The receipt of later returns from yesterday's elections in this city and the State show practically no change in the figures given out last night. In New York County the entire regular Democratic ticket was elected by pluralities averaging about 20,000. Of the twenty-one districts in New York County the Democrats elected 11 Assemblymen and the Republicans 4. A Democratic gain of 4. The Republicans will probably have a majority of 24 in the Assembly, a Republican gain of 10.

In King's County (Brooklyn) the Democratic ticket was elected by pluralities averaging 14,000, except that Gray (Republican) for Registrar was defeated by Howe (Republican) by 483 votes. This was due to the narrow margin in the party. In King's County the latest figures show an Assembly defeat made up of 12 Democrats and 9 Republicans, a Republican gain of 3. In Queens County the Democrats elected two Assemblymen and the Republicans one. In Richmond County the Democrats elected one Assemblyman, as usual, a Democrat.

The result of the election in the State outside New York City shows Republican gains in Assemblymen and a gain of municipal officers in many of the cities. The Tammany men openly denounce Senator Hill, blaming him for reverses up the State.

Nash Safe in Ohio. Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 8.—Unofficial returns have been received from all counties in Ohio, with a few scattering precincts estimated. 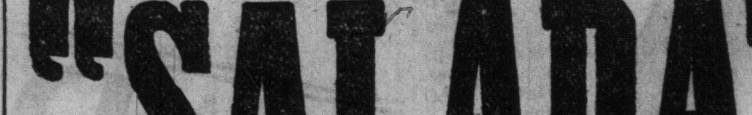

JOUBERT PROVES A DOG. The Statement That He Would Not Let the Women and Children Leave Ladysmith Confirmed.

Eastport, Natal, Nov. 6.—Mr. Bernard, proprietor of the Railway Hotel at Ladysmith, has arrived here with a companion, having eluded the Boer outposts by night, riding along Kaffir paths. He confirms the report that when Gen. Buller requested that the women and children be permitted to depart, Gen. Joubert replied that he would only allow them to get away under the muzzle or fire of his guns.

TRIBUTE TO MR. RITCHIE. To the Ready Assistance and Loyalty the Colonies Displayed in the Boer War.

London, Nov. 8.—Mr. Charles T. Ritchie, president of the Board of Trade, speaking this evening in Loughdon, paid a warm tribute to the "ready assistance and loyalty" of the colonies in time of difficulty and danger, and to the friendly attitude of the United States, "which shows that the Americans are with us in the struggle for the freedom of our fellow-subjects in South Africa."

GENERAL BULLER AT WORK. Has Taken Effective Steps to Prevent Any Further Boer Advance.

London, Nov. 9.—The Daily Mail has the following despatch from Queenstown, Cape Colony, dated Sunday night: "The railway staff is withdrawing from all the border stations between this and the Boer line. There is no cause for alarm, however, with reference to the border towns. Gen. Buller has taken effective steps to check any further advance. Censorship prevents particularly, but you may expect good news soon."

BULLER'S MESSAGE TO WHITE. Said to Have Been Received at Ladysmith on Saturday-Morning Still Holds Out.

London, Nov. 9, 4:30 a.m.—There is practically no further news from the seat of war this morning. It is asserted under the hand of a reliable source that Gen. Buller received a message from Sir Redvers Buller on Saturday night, but, however, no message appears to have been received in London concerning Thursday's and Friday's sorties.

Expected in a Few Hours. A special despatch from Pietermaritzburg, dated Sunday night, is confidently expected that railway communication will be restored with Ladysmith within a few hours.

Making Siege a Farce. Further details from Mafeking, carrying events up to October 27th, indicate that the Boer attack was repulsed. The Boers were in high spirits and the siege was becoming a farce. The correspondent says that the people were in the habit of shouting from the house tops, "more shells," and that the Boers had been expiring in the town, into which the men would dive when the smoke of the Boers' big gun was seen.

Plumer Nearing Mafeking. According to a despatch from Kimberley, British Bechuanaland, dated Monday, Col. Plumer's column, marching from Fort Tuli, reached the town of Mafeking, and had Avogel Kop, opposite Oost, 10 miles north of Lobatse, on October 18th, and was nearing Mafeking.

Her Majesty's Kind Act. Her Majesty has written a letter of condolence to the mother of the late Colonel Egerton of the British Rifle Corps, who was fatally wounded by the explosion of a shell at the bombardment of Ladysmith on November 2nd, when as a gunner lieutenant, he was in charge of one of the cruiser's big guns.

MILNER VISITS THE WOUNDED. Remarkable Wounds Made by Boer Bullets—Cape Dutch Still Neutral.

Cape Town, Sunday, Nov. 5.—Sir Alfred Milner visited the wounded today. They are all doing well. Some of the wounds are of an extraordinary nature. The Mafeking bullet wounds are far in and out of the bone and muscle. Soldiers shot through both cheeks have lost the sense of feeling, and some have lost the power of speech. Most of the wounds are in the hands and arms.

Volunteers' Ambitions. The local volunteers have again expressed a desire of going to the front.

MORAL EFFECT EXCELLENT. General Brocklehurst's Operations on Friday, Nov. 4.—Details in regard to Gen. Brocklehurst's operations Friday, towards Dewdrop, show that the British force consisted of the 18th and 10th Hussars, cavalry with 100 mounted infantry, 100 light dragoons, 100 mounted light horse and two batteries. At midday Gen. Buller's force of 1,000 men, including the 10th Hussars, 100 mounted light horse and two batteries, moved forward to meet the Boers.

Boers Used the White Flag. In Zululand to Get Close to the British, When They Fired.

Lorenzo Marquez, Nov. 5.—(Delayed in transmission.)—A rumor from Jugumana, Zululand, says that the Boers have been driven back by the British territory and advanced towards the fort at Ingamuna with a white flag. When they reached the fort, however, they had been evacuated. The Boers fired at the British, but the British did not return the fire.

BRITAIN SHOULD HAVE IT ALL. Hon. Warner Miller's Expression Regarding South Africa—Best Americans Say So, Too.

Montreal, Nov. 8.—(Special.)—"The best men of the United States and in fact the best people of our country are most desirous that Great Britain should possess the whole of South Africa. The cause of humanity demands the submission of the Boers to the British, and when people like the Boers can settle down in a country and above the elbow, and his face and shoulder were bruised. NO SECOND CONTINGENT. IT MIGHT BE A GOOD THING. Imperial Government Thanks Us, but Suggestion to Adopt Wireless Telegraphy for Signalling at Belle Isle Light.

Metropolitan Railway and C. P. R. Decision Reserved by Railway Committee—Subway or Viaduct at Lansdowne-Avenue.

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—(Special.)—The Imperial Government will not accept another Canadian contingent for service in South Africa. The Governor-General this morning received a telegram from Mr. Joseph Chamberlain expressing the cordial thanks of Her Majesty's Government for the intimation that the Government of Canada would like to know whether more troops were necessary, and assuring the Canadian Administration that no further aid from the Dominion is considered necessary.

The Metropolitan's Application. At the Railway Committee of the Privy Council today the application of the Metropolitan Railway to connect with the Canadian Pacific Railway at Lansdowne Avenue was heard, and was reserved.

SUBWAY OR VIADUCT. Must Be Built at Lansdowne-Avenue—Temporary Crossing in the Meantime.

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—(Special.)—The Railway Committee of the Privy Council today handed down a decision in the Lansdowne Avenue crossing case. It has decided that a subway or overhead crossing must be built, but will permit of the construction of a temporary level crossing, provided that the city agrees to construct the permanent one later.

BELL TOOK THE TOWN. General MacArthur Has Occupied Another Point and Without Losing a Man.

Manila, Nov. 8.—General MacArthur has occupied Manila. His entire line, including the 12th, 17th and 9th Infantry and part of the 4th Cavalry, is extended three miles in front of Aguinaldo, in a good tactical position. Major Bell took Malabac being occupied by the enemy yesterday. Being ordered to the front, he pushed into the town, driving out two companies of insurgents and killing several Filipino officers. The Americans suffered no loss.

Hit by a Trolley. Bleeding from a score of wounds, and suffering from a slight concussion of the brain, John Savigny of Simcoe-street, brought to the recovery hospital in the police ambulance last night. He received the injuries and skull fracture from a trolley car, which was struck by a trolley car at the intersection of Brant-street and King-street, by a westbound car, about 9 o'clock, and narrowly escaped being killed. He was crossing the street at the time, and failed to notice the approaching car. Dr. H. Little of Spadina-avenue attended to the injured man, after he had been carried into the Hospital for Sick Children.
