## Latest Oil Developments. The Welland county gas wells, it is

Now they are hoping to discover oil Two years ago, while exploring new territory for gas, the Provincial Company found traces of oil. This was kept a profound secret for some time, while the company were leasing all the property in the vicinity. Since that time they have expended over \$30,000 in search of oil in paying quantities, but have not succeeded in striking it rich enough, though many Various Warlike Movements on the wells show the presence of the illuminating liquid. The search for oil in the Northwest Territories has not, as yet, been more successful. Mr. W. A. Fraser, the oil expert, who has been boring on behalf of the Government at Athabasca Landing, has been there all summer. The boring has been carried to a depth of 1,730 feet, and a steel casing put down to that depth. The intention is, if possible, to go about 200 feet lower, in the hope of striking flow of oil. Gas has been freely piped since the casing was put down, but no oil. If the experiment then does not prove to be a success a new location will be tried. It is believed that there is plenty of oil in the region if it could only be struck.

Canada has therefore plenty of scope, and it is said that thousands of excellent foreign settlers would gladly join their compatriots in the Northwest in the spring f the Government would assist in the expenses of transit. Political freedom makes Canada a paradise to continental emigrants, while they are far less exacting than English and Scotch

# GREAT FLOODS

Thousands of People in Siberia Render-

ed Homeless. Mail advices from Siberia report great floods there, by which thousands have been rendered homeless and destitute. The Siphoon, Morn, Santa Chasa and Inman rivers are all out of their banks, and the plains for hundreds of miles are covered by a great lake, the water in some cases being 26 feet deep. The Siberian Railway has been flooded for a distance of 120 versts, from Inman, the terminus of the road, and many large washouts are reported elsewhere. Telegraphic ommunication with Vladisvostock was interrupted for several days. Grain crops, which were being harvested, vere all destroyed, together with farm buildings.

Thousands of cattle were drowned. Meager reports contain information of a heavy loss of life. The governor of Vladivostock has dispatched several companies of soldiers with steam launches and lifeboats to the scene of the disaster to assist in rescue work. doubtedly be caused in the agricul-
