Who Continues to Follow in the Foot steps of the Late Archbishop Walsh - A Popular Selection-Sketch of the New Archbishop.

Toronto, April 5. - The Catholic Register, of this city, publishes the following official announcement regarding the archbishopric of Toronto, which has been vacant since the death of Archbishop Walsh, on Aug. 1, last

year: "St. Michael's Palace, April 5, 1899 .-It will be learned with pleasure that the new archbishop of Toronto has been chosen by the Holy See. I am authorized to state that the Most Rev. Denis O'Connor, D.D., Bishop of London, received his official appointment as archbishop of Toronto, last week. The installation will take place in St. Michael's Cathedral probably the first week in May. Due notice will be given of the precise date of this imposing ceremony. In the meantime the very reverend administrator will continue to look after the affairs of the archdiocese. The 'Te Deum' will be sung after the late mass on next Sunday in all the city churches as a thanksgiving to the Almighty. (Signed) Jos. J. McCann, administrator, arch-

There were three names submitted to the consideration of the pope. The nomination of the clergy of the Toronto diocese was Vicar-General Mc-Cann, the present administrator of the archdiocese. But the bishops of the ecclesiastical province of which the archdiocese of Toronto is a part, chose two names from their own ranks, and sent them along with Bishop McCann's name to Rome. Both of these names happened to be O'Connor, one the bishop of London, and the other bishop of Peterboro, and the London prelate was the choice of the Vatican.

Most Rev. Denis O'Connor, D.D. archbishop-elect, was born of Irish par-entage in the township of Pickering, in the Toronto diocese, March 28, 1841. In many respects his career has been similar to that of the late Archbishop Walsh. The late archbishop was a priest in the diocese of Toronto before he became bishop of London, and was transferred from the London see to the archbishopric. Archbishop O'Connor received a large part of his education at St. Michael's College in Toronto, and has received preferment in the same way as his predecessor.

His elevation is approved by all ranks of the clergy and laity. He has administered the diocese of London most capably, has paid off a large debt on the cathedral, and will leave the diocese in a flourishing condition. He is agreed to be by age, experience, education and ability the fittest man to fill the highest ecclesiastical position in Ontario. Bishop O'Connor is a man of European education. After his theological course in Canada, he studied in Germany and at Rome, deepening and strengthening his knowledge in many departments. He returned to Canada in 1863, and was ordained priest at St. Mary's Church, Toronto. The first years of his ministry were spent as professor, but to this was very early added the supervision of the temporal affairs of the college; and in both relations he showed such talent for business and direction that before the age of thirty he was appointed superior of Assumption College in Sandwich, which the late Archbishop Walsh-then of Londonwas striving to put on a new footing. He was principal of this college for some time, and was transferred thence to the see of London. In 1888 he received the degree of Doctor of Divinity. The issue of securities on the extension of the Pipestone and Stonewall branches was authorized, and the lease of the Columbia and Western Railway ap-An extended agreement with the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie Railway Company—the "Soo Line"—was approved, providing for taking up certain maturing interest-bearing obligations of that company, and payment of certain current obligations, and for equipment terminals and additions acquired or required, by the creation of five million dollars' second mortgage four per cent bonds of the Soo Company, interest to be guaranteed by the C. P. R. on a million and a half of the bonds, to be for the new St. Louis club.
