Mr. Shaw lost no opportunity of airing himself and gave his views at great length, until Mr. Clemens turned up, when Mr. Shaw introduced himself. Mr. Shaw went off. Mark Twain was left at the mercy of the interviewers, who discovered that the humorist is most interested in the pageants now so popular here, and that he intends to go to the Oxford pageant.

Mark Twain spent the afternoon in paying calls on Lord Curzon, Ambassador and Mrs. Reid, and in receiving a host of callers himself. He has postponed his return to the United States the French capital.
