Dine Together

On the Invitation of the American Ambassador in Paris.

Spain Given to Understand That Uncle Sam Will Pay No Cuban Debt.

Paris, Oct. 19.-General Horace Porter, the United States ambassador, gave a banquet last evening at the American embassy to the United States and Spanish peace commissioners. The banquet rooms was elaborately hung with tapestries and armor; flowers were in profusion, and the effects through the stained glass were very beautiful. A large number of distinguished personages were present. The meeting of the two commissions at the same table is a notable event here, and borrows special interest from the semiprejudicial statement of the Paris correspondent of the London Times that the Spaniards would not meet their opponents at dinner under the roof of

the American embassy. CLEAR UNDERSTANDING. A Paris dispatch says: Spain can no longer have any doubt regarding the ultimate attitude of the United States toward the so-called debt. The American commissioners decline to assume it or any part of it, by express treaty or by contract. They also declined to accept a cession of sovereignty to the from the batteries fired a salute. United States: for in that case Spain would claim that such a cession by its own force would impose the obligation for that debt. It is confidently believed that, in refusing to accept a cession of sovereignty the American commissioners are acting also upon their announcement to the world in the intervention resolutions, disclaiming any intention to exercise sovereignty or authority over Cuba, except

FOR PACIFICATION. and then to leave the island to the control of its people and its people to the assumption of its obligations. This position of the commissioners couples station with the sultan, the grand vizier itself with the declaration in the resolution that "the people of Cuba are by right and ought to be free and independent," and good faith requires the performance of this declaration, it being held that if Cuba were annexed to the United States, while she might be free, she would not be independent.

The Dreyfus Affair Said to Have Driven Him Daft.

New York, Oct. 19 .- A dispatch to the World from Paris says: Henri Rochefort is believed to have gone crazy over the Dreyfus agitation. The reported decision of the court of Cassation that Mme. Dreyfus' lawyer shall see the Dreyfus dossiler, has caused Rochefort to demand in his paper, L'Intransigeant, "that the members of the court of cassation having been previously drawn up in single file, an executioner duly trained to the work should cut off their eyelids, so as to leave the eyeballs denuded, and then spiders of the most venomous kind should be inclosed in nutshells, and applied to the eyeballs, properly fastened behind the culprits' heads. The Kaiser and the Sultan Shake Hands on the Banks of the Bosphorus-Much Powder Burned and Great Effusiveness Displayed.

Constantinople, Oct. 19 .- At 8:30 a. m. the German Emperor's yacht Hohenzollern, accompanied by the German warships Hertha and Hela, and the sultan's yacht Izzedin, with the Turkish imperial commander on board, and followed by a number of special steamers, chartered by members of the German colony, or conveying sight-seers, appeared off old Seraglio point, and the guns of Selimieh Barracks thundered a salute.

PLENTY OF POWDER. After passing Seraglio point the Hela Yildse Kiosk yesterday evening 120 covreturned the salute. The Hertha followed with a direct return salute, and the Turkish batteries ashore and the guardship Toppane promptly re-

sponded. The ships in the harbor were decorated with flags and flew the German and Turkish flags at their mastheads. The Hohenzollern anchored at 8:45 off the Dolmabagtche Palace. Soon afterwards the Emperor and Empress of Germany entered the Hohenzollern's long boat, and were rowed to the palace landing stage, where they were received by the Sultan of Turkey, who was surrounded by a brilliant suite. As the landing took place, the German warships and a hundred guns scene was most animated. Crowds of spectators thronged the approaches to salutes and the palace during shouted a welcome to their majesties. which was answered by the "hochs' of the German sailors. A CORDIAL MEETING.

The meeting between the sultan and his guests was most cordial. The sultan warmly shook hands with the emperor and empress, and, offering his arm to the empress, he led the way to a pavillion of the palace, where the was another royal salute and the im perial band played the German national anthem, announced to crowds assembled outside that their majesties were coming out of the pal-ace grounds. Prominent among the troops were the sultan's bodyguard of Albanians and the imperial guard, in new white uniforms, embroidered in

The whole party proceeded to the Yildiz Kiosk, amid the deafening plaudits of the crowd. The sultan and the emperor and empress subsequently exchanged visits.
