The Boss Must Be Heard, but His Workman—Never!

Our city contemporary the Free Press prints the following most unjustifiable attack on the Advertiser:

"The tactics employed by the London Advertiser in making the business arrangements between Mr. Beck and his workmen an issue in the election seem intended as an invitation to a similar investigation of the private affairs of Col. Leys. Does the Colonel desire that kind of campaign? If so, Mr. Beck can stand it!"

We call readers of this journal to witness if we have ever made the "business arrangements between Mr. Beck and his workmen an issue in the election." Our contemporary knows that what it prints is untrue. It knows that Mr. Beck alone raised the issue by publicly dragging on the platform the case of Mr. D. Wiley, formerly in his employ, but who was compelled to leave it under the extraordinary circumstances detailed in his letter printed in the Advertiser last night. Mr. Beck having made the matter a public issue, surely the reputable workman, whose good faith was assailed, and whose motives were characterized by Mr. Beck as base, had a right to be heard.

Our contemporary prints Mr. Beck's attack on his late employ, Mr. Wiley. In big black type, every day. It is extremely anxious that the employer's side of the dispute should be known and read by all men. But it does not print Mr. Wiley's manly rejoinder. The Advertiser printed Mr. Beck's attack on Mr. Wiley, and when that workman presented a letter giving his side of the "squeeze out" narrative, and Mr. Beck's attempt to make him sign a paper exonerating him, surely, in all fairness, the request could not be refused.

The argument of the Free Press clearly is that only the side of the employer should be heard; that the workman, no matter how well he stands with his fellow-citizens, shall have his mouth shut and his communications suppressed, lest the feelings of his employer be hurt, or his pretensions for election purposes be exposed! That is not the view that we entertain of the respective rights of employer and employee.

To attempt to burk investigation by silly innuendoes against Col. Leys is most unwise. If our contemporary has anything to say against Col. Leys, let it take the manly course of saying it. Col. Leys asserts that he is ready to meet any accusation that is made by a responsible person, but such threats as are indulged in by our contemporary are unworthy of it, and cannot be taken seriously.

For our part, let us say, we neither defend Mr. Beck, his race horses, nor the mode of treating his men into the campaign. Mr. Beck and his sportsmen have done so, and he would ill become a journal, printed for the whole people, to follow the gratuitous advice now tendered us, and refuse full justice to the employ as well as to his employer.

We are well aware that the view is entertained by some that a workman has no right to be heard in a controversy like that which Mr. Beck, in his speech at the Opera House, forced into the campaign. But that is not the view of the Advertiser. It is not the view of the union workmen of the city, nor of the large majority of the people of London.

May we suggest to the Free Press that before it again prints Mr. Beck's black type attack on Mr. D. Wiley, it squeezed out employ, it also prints, in as prominent form, Mr. Wiley's rejoinder to Mr. Beck's tactics and subsequent procedure.

To vote for Mr. Beck is to vote against the Ontario Government.

The Conservative Hamilton Spectator a few years ago called the present Conservative candidate, Mr. Carscallen, "a dead duck." The statement was premature, but March 1 will show it to have been singularly prophetic.

Do You Want the Normal School?

The vote on the 1st of March will be, indirectly, a sort of plebiscite on the question, "Do you want a Normal School at London?" To vote for Col. Leys will be practically a vote in favor of a Normal School at London, the Opposition newspapers and speakers throughout the country being opposed to its establishment here.

The "Maine" Horror.

The disaster to the United States battleship Maine is not only terrible in its mortality, but is peculiarly unfortunate for both Spain and the United States. Unless the cause can be clearly and speedily proved to be accidental, the calamity may have international consequences. The relations of Spain and the United States are already near the breaking point, and little is required to sever them completely. The visit of a United States battleship to the harbor of Havana would under ordinary circumstances have no significance; but the Spanish jingoes are so incensed at the Cuban policy of the Republic that they regarded the Maine's presence as a menace and an insult to Spain. In view of this it is not unnatural that the people of the United States should entertain suspicions of foul play. One cannot believe that the Spanish authorities would stoop to such diabolical vengeance, but even if the explosion proves to be the work of irresponsible persons, acting without official cognizance, it will enrage the United States people, who are already heated over the De Lome incident. If the affair was accidental there will be an overwhelming cry against the naval administration of the United States by its own citizens. The misfortunes of Uncle Sam's battleships in late years have been so numerous and costly as to create public alarm and mistrust, which the Maine horror will deepen into fierce indignation.

To vote for Col. Leys is to vote for the Ontario Government.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Press Association will be held in Ottawa March 10 and 11. Among the important matters to be considered will be the postage question, insolvency legislation, and the visit of the British Journalists to Canada. Frank A. Munsey, who has been without doubt the most successful modern publisher, will deliver an address on and discuss the "Elements of Success in Newspaper Publishing." It is hoped that one or two of the following representatives of the British Institute of Journalists will be present: Lord Giesels (London Morning Post), Sir Hugh G. Reid, M.P., J. M. MacLean, M.P., and Sir Edward Russell. The dinner will take place as usual, when a number of important speeches will be made.

Educational Critics.

The Learned Pig criticizing Plato was not in it with some of the critics of the educational system of Ontario. As Dr. Dewar, the well known educational authority, said in a speech the other day, much of the criticism is obviously that of persons who do not understand what they are talking about. Perhaps we might give the report of this part of Dr. Dewar's speech in full:

"Respecting the criticism of educational matters, the doctor said that he had received more unjust onslaughts than the minister of education. And the criticisms merely showed how little the critics knew about matters educational. To sever the three links that bind the public school, the high school and the university would be a tremendously retrograde step. (Applause.) Mr. Whitney had promised when placed in power to sit down and formulate a policy for the country. I think he will have time to do the sitting down," added the doctor, and the crowd cheered lustily.

"As a member of the board of regents of Victoria College and of the senate of the University for a number of years," continued the doctor, "I have had some special opportunities of forming an opinion on this subject, and I do not hesitate to say that the whole of the criticism upon the educational administration of the not really understand what they are talking about. They want to find fault, but they have not the grasp and grip of their subject to speak of it intelligently, or in such a way as to commend itself to men who are familiar with educational work."

Of every \$100 spent by the Ontario Government \$19.93 goes to maintain public institutions, which would otherwise have to be sustained by a tax on the municipalities; \$16.95 for education; \$15.12 for public works and buildings; \$9.74 for justice; \$5.61 for railway; \$4.94 for agriculture; \$4.22 for hospitals and charities; \$3.18 for civil government; \$3.55 for legislation; \$2.87 for colonization roads; \$2.48 for crown lands; 18 cents for immigration, and \$4.89 for unclassified items.

Another Stolen Letter.

Senor de Lome, the Spanish Minister at Washington, wrote a confidential letter to a friend in Madrid, in which he termed President McKinley a low politician. The letter was stolen from the United States mail and published, and the Senator has in consequence purchased tickets for home. The misfortune is, not that the letter was published, for it will not rupture the international relations, but that discreetly cast upon the United States mail service, though no suspicion attaches to the Government itself. Hereafter foreign diplomats will probably keep their own couriers to transmit their documents and letters, lest these should fall into hostile hands. There is not a minister or ambassador at Washington, however friendly, whose position would not be imperilled by publication of his official correspondence.

Still Another Dreadful Steamship Disaster.

The Flaclet Wrecked Off the Canary Islands—86 Persons Perish.

Loss of the Clara Nevada With 40 People on Board Confirmed.

Teneriffe, Canary Islands, Feb. 17.—The Compagnie Generale Transatlantique liner Flaclet, bound from Marseilles for Colon, was totally wrecked off Anaga Point, this island, at 1 o'clock yesterday morning. Her captain, second officer, eleven of her crew and one passenger were saved. Thirty-eight of the crew and 48 passengers were lost.

The Flaclet struck on Anaga Point during a thick fog. Heavy weather prevailed at the time, and the steamer soon broke in two. The survivors to Santa Cruz, and after landing them, returned to the scene of the disaster to endeavor to render further assistance.

THE CLARA NEVADA.

Victor, B. C. Feb. 17.—The steamer Islander brought details of the sinking of the Clara Nevada, opposite Seaview City, in Berners Bay. The eyewitness says the ship was standing on the beach, and saw the steamer struggling against the waves. Suddenly the ship was lifted by a wave, and the steamer burst into flames, going down a few seconds later. She had 25 passengers, and a crew of 15. The steamer Rustler, of Juneau, is searching for possible survivors.

OIL IN SARNIA TOWNSHIP

Eighteen Wells Sunk on the Bushnell Property—Good Results.

Sarnia Observer: The oil development along the London road, from Sarnia and Plympton town line, westward has so far resulted in the sinking of eighteen wells by the Bushnell Oil Company, under the direction of Messrs. Brewer and Stokes. A power house has been built on the Bushnell farm, in which a large steam boiler has been placed in position, and the usual machinery of wells is being installed. Eight of the wells have been connected with the pumping plant and have been worked with good results. All are classed as good wells and a few are above the average. The result of the operations in this regard has been satisfactory, and further development, extending westward toward the town, will be undertaken this season. The wells on the sides of the London road, two on Switzer's, two on Chris. Fulse's, two on Miller's, two on T. Bulman's, two on Griffin's, two on Ed. Hillier's, and one each on Henry Young's and James Morrison's farms.

SUNDAY DEED IS VOID

A Missouri Court Takes Such a Position.

St. Louis, Feb. 17.—The appeal of Fontaine & Co. of St. Louis, from the decision of the United States circuit court of Arkansas in their suit against Henry C. and Laura Hite to foreclose a deed of trust, has resulted in an affirmative judgment on the part of the defendants in the court of appeals, the court holding that the deed was void because executed on Sunday.

The remains of George W. Wrigglesworth, a pioneer farmer of Esquesing, who died sixteen years ago, were interred at Guelph on Tuesday.

Ald. Charles Baxter, of Windsor, Ont., will leave for the Klondike next week, representing the Northwest Exploration Company, of Chicago.

J. Clark, of Corinth, expects to start for the Klondike gold fields next Monday. Mr. Clark has had some experience in mining in California and Alaska, and is thoroughly equipped for the Yukon.

Mr. Dan Hennick, of Logan, is getting the material on the ground for an immense barn. It will be 60 by 100 feet, with stabling under, and when finished will be one of the finest in the township.

Mr. Wm. Armstrong, of Delmer, an aged and respected citizen, passed away on Tuesday. Mr. Armstrong had for some years been a partner between Delmer and Tilsonburg, and also carried on a pump business in Delmer.

The bylaw relating to the proposed loan of \$25,000 to Dorland Co., passed by the Clinton council, and will be voted on by the electors on March 14. The loan is of considerable importance to the welfare of Clinton that the business be retained there.

Guelph Herald: The carpet factories of Armstrong and McPherson Bros. have amalgamated, and will enlarge their business to double its present capacity. Formerly about 30 hands were employed by the two factories, and it is now the intention to employ about 60.

ENLISTING THE BRITISH

Why the Bargain With the Englewood Syndicate Was Entered Into.

Mr. Whitney blames the government for entering into a contract with a syndicate of English capitalists for the development of our mining resources. The transaction is a very simple one. We possess 35,000,000 acres of mineral lands, supposed to be very valuable, which so far have been but partially explored. A firm of English capitalists have placed on deposit with the government \$20,000 as a guarantee of their good intentions, the amount to be forfeited should they not comply with the conditions of the contract made with them. They have received a lease of 15,000 acres and 30,000 acres respectively, on the condition that they shall spend \$30,000 the first year, \$40,000 the second year and \$50,000 the third year in exploration and development. Should they find any mineral deposit they will be permitted to buy the land at the same price as any other explorer.

Having regard to the fact that this large area has been so far unproductive, the government might be considered the offer of the syndicate most opportune, and I am glad to be able to say that they have already placed a number of prospectors in the field for the purpose of testing thoroughly its mineral resources. Should they find gold in the course of their work, and who is to be blamed for that? Mr. Whitney's will doubtless lead to the development of the other lands owned by the government, and in this way a large revenue will accrue to the government and a large addition be made to the population of the province. I have yet to hear of any progressive Canadian who condemns the transaction as unbusinesslike. So satisfactory did it appear when discussed in the house that nearly all the independent members voted with the government and against Mr. Whitney's proposal.

What has Ontario to expect from a leader who would refuse British capital, voluntarily offered, for the development of his country, and who is incapable of rising to the importance of changing what is now a vast wilderness, practically unproductive, into settlements for a mining population whose industry would add millions to the wealth of Ontario?

The efforts of the government to develop our mines by English capital and otherwise are unworthy of consideration. Hon. George W. Ross at Oakville.
