

Crop Conditions Improved But Recovery is Not Complete

Modern Miller Predicts Falling Off in Winter Wheat Output—
Grain Exchanges Have Easier Tone for Wheat.

Liverpool wheat futures closed 1/4d lower, at 4 1/4d higher; corn 1/4d to 1/2d higher; Chicago July wheat closed 1/4d lower; corn unchanged, and oats 1/4d higher. Winnipeg car lots of wheat to-day 28, against 30 this day last year. Northwest car lots to-day 27, against 30 last year. Chicago car lots to-day: Wheat 3, constant; corn 27, 18; oats 14, 13.

Modern Miller says: Winter wheat millers generally report an improvement in the crop conditions since May 1, the best prospects in the southeast, the poorest in the southwest. The unfavorable effects of the drought last fall in delaying seeding, and the lack of moisture this spring in the southwest, have not been entirely recovered from, and the prospects are for a winter wheat crop of about 400,000,000 bushels.

\$1.35 For New Wheat.
FORT WORTH, Texas, June 4.—Reports received here from the wheat growing belt of North Texas show that the first of this season's wheat in the United States is being contracted for to-day at \$1.35 and upwards. In some instances farmers are securing contracts that will give them any advance that may occur in the market at the time the wheat is raised.
Millers are buying the crop at the prevailing quotations. Threshing will be in many fields around Denton to-morrow.

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ment report, which is to be issued on June 15. As we have previously advised, the market should prove a scalping affair with safety on the long side and a fair decline in July, but by Sept. and Dec. on all fair declines.

Wheat—The foreign markets were steady to shade easier. There was no special feature to our market. There was profit taking again in the July on the hard spots and buying of December. At the present difference we believe July worth the money. The cash demand was better. Sales of 10,000 bushels reported. It looks as tho there would be a liberal decrease in the visible Monday. We believe in higher prices for wheat, but would buy only on the breaks.

Wheat—There was liberal selling of July by the prominent bulls and buying of September and December. July sold off, but the deferred futures did not respond to the weakness in July. We still advise buying steady, and Dec. on all soft spots. Market closed 1/4c to 1/2c lower.

Corn—Has shown remarkable strength. All options making new high records and unless receipts increase considerably higher values will be seen.

Oats—Opened firm and gained a little strength on local shorts covering. Trade has been quiet. On any bad crop news oats will sell easily.

Great Crop Report.
WASHINGTON, June 4.—The growing crop of cotton on May 25 was 51 1/2 per cent. of a normal condition, against 79.7 a year ago, and ten-year average of 81.4. The area planted this year is about 86.6 per cent. of the area planned to cotton last year, and aggregates about 2,518,000 acres, valued at \$1,400,000,000, or 44 per cent. from the bureau's revised estimate of last year's planted area.
