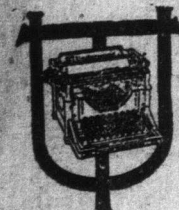

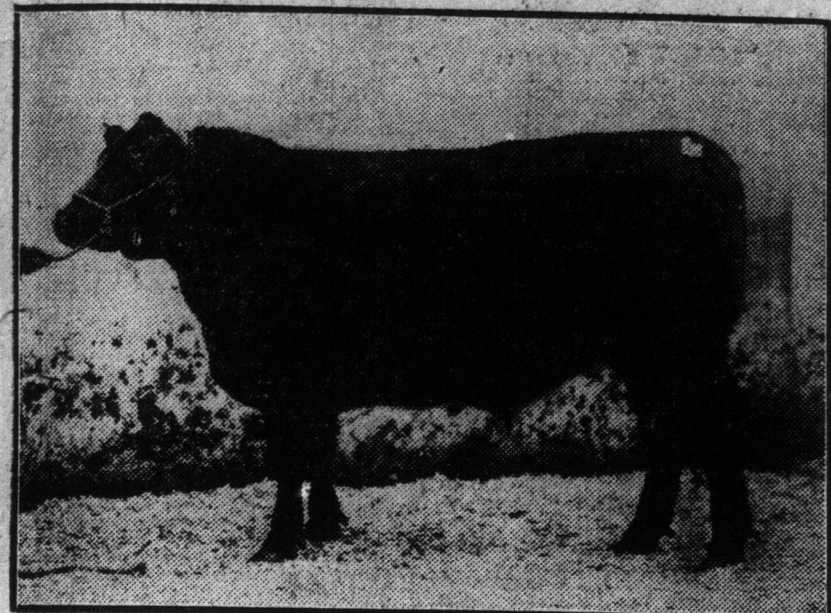

CLERGY OF QUEBEC TO AID RECRUITING

Col. Arthur Mignault Receives Encouragement From Archbishop Bruchesi.

MUST DO SOMETHING

Bishops May Issue Mandement Against Bourassa in Near Future.

Montreal, Dec. 10.—There are signs on every side that the higher clergy in this province are about to take an energetic stand favoring a more vigorous participation in the war by the French-Canadian people. Col. Arthur Mignault, who has been authorized to superintend recruiting in every French group in the Dominion, and who has already made a vigorous beginning, has had a long interview with Archbishop Bruchesi, and expressed his sympathy of his grace and the special en-

couragement extended the colonel by the highest religious authority in this section of the country. It is not at all improbable that an episcopal mandement will be issued in the near future, for the bishops fully realize that something has to be done if the province is not left in a very bad position at the end of the war.

Abbe Damour's letters and his brochure, "Where Are We Drifting?" has had a great deal to do in the way of awakening public conscience to the duty of the hour, and once the movement receives an impetus from high church authorities, no surprise need be felt if there is a great gain of activity in military circles here. A bombshell is also expected from Quebec, as it is well known that Cardinal Begin is in thorough sympathy with his journalistic mouthpiece, and he will no doubt repudiate Mr. Bourassa, who writes in Le Devoir to the effect that Abbe Damours does not speak for the cardinal, but simply for himself.

Chatham, Dec. 9.—The Kent County Council today granted \$500 to the Belgian Relief Fund, for which a canvass has been conducted both in the city and county during the week.

The session closed at noon today, following a general discussion on routine matters, during which a bylaw was submitted recommending Dr. R. V. Bray, as deputy jail surgeon and physician to the house of refuge.

A committee was appointed to discuss the advisability of appointing a police magistrate for the county, and to make a recommendation.

J. H. Smith, inspector of schools for West Kent, was recommended as a member of the senate for the Western University, London.

Confer Degrees Today on Men in Service of Empire

The senate of the university at its last meeting determined to hold a special convocation in the west hall of the main building today at 5 p.m., for the purpose of conferring degrees on those graduates, particularly in medicine, who have enlisted and are preparing to proceed overseas.

The friends of these graduates will have an opportunity to show appreciation of the action of this latest group of university men in answering the call to duty, and if needs be, to sacrifice.

Fight Likely in East Toronto

E. F. B. Johnston Asked to Run

Petitions, which in the aggregate will bear several thousand names, asking E. F. B. Johnston, K.C., to oppose the election of Hon. A. E. Kemp, minister of militia, indicates that a contest will take place in East Toronto.

Some independent Liberals and many Conservatives, it is declared, are asking that a strong candidate be placed in the field, and many express themselves in favor of someone to oppose Hon. A. E. Kemp.

In addition to favoring the candidacy of Mr. Johnston, the petitioners register thru this means their disapproval of the administration of public affairs of the country under the Borden government.
