#### PETER MCARTHUR TALKS ABOUT THE RED COW

Noted Canadian Writer Lecturing For Red Cross Fund at Massey Hall.

Peter McArthur, the well known writer and author, who is giving a humorous lecture, "The Red Cow," Wednesday evening at Massey Hall, in aid of the Red Cross Fund, started his life on an Ontario farm, attended the high school at Strathroy, and ended up at the University of Toronto, leaving after a few months to enter journalism. His first position was with The Toronto Mail, later going to New York. There he began writing heavy articles on economic



questions, and ending by writing jokes and humorous verse for Life, The Sun, Judge, Truth, Town Topics, The Star, and other publications. He then became editor and art manager of Truth. Two years later he gave up this position, later going to London, Eng., contributing chiefly to the Review of Reviews and Punch. While in London he produced a work known as "To Be Taken With Salt." Being an Essay on Teaching One's Grandmother How To Suck Eggs. He also published "Prodigal and Other Poems." And now his latest success "In Pastures Green." #### FRUIT FROM CANADA FOR TROOPS AT FRONT

Women of Hamilton District Have Forwarded Second Consignment

#### LAD'S BODY IS FOUND

Edgar Rosebush Lost Life While Skating One Week Ago.

HAMILTON, Jan. 15.—Another consignment of canned fruit put up by the women of Hamilton and the surrounding district for the Canadian soldiers in the hospitals of England and France has been shipped from the Canadian Club fruit headquarters and consisted of 565 cases. The consignment was shipped in a heated refrigerator car on the C.P.R. to St. John, N.B., whence it will be shipped to the old country. In all, about 50,000 quarts were forwarded from here, but this does not include a large quantity of dried fruit, which still remains to be forwarded.

**Body Is Found.**  
 The body of Edgar Rosebush, the 16-year-old son of Dr. and Mrs. Rosebush, 38 South James street, who was drowned in the bay one week ago this afternoon while skating, was recovered shortly before 11 o'clock this morning by John Morris, the Wentworth street boatman, and his two sons, John and Alexander, within a few feet of the spot where it went down.

**A Father's Reply.**  
 On Monday night a meeting will be held in the board of trade rooms, under the auspices of the committee of one hundred, which has for its object the securing of total prohibition of the liquor traffic during the war. A member of official of that committee called a prominent local minister by phone yesterday and asked him to attend the meeting, informing him that about thirty prominent business men of Hamilton would be there, and mentioning the names of two.

"What are you going to do?" asked the minister.  
 "Speeches will be made and we will decide what we are going to do," was the answer.  
 "I haven't time to listen to speeches," said the minister.  
 "Well, you will be there, won't you?" the official asked.  
 "Are you of military age?" asked the minister.  
 "What has that got to do with it?" demanded the enquirer.  
 "Just this," was the reply. "I am doing only one thing until the end of this war. Good-bye."

**Another Hero Back.**  
 Another wounded soldier who returned to his home yesterday is Gunner Murray, formerly of this city, but now of Paris, Ontario, who at the outbreak of the war enlisted with the Fourth Field Battery, Canadian Trench Battalion. He reached here served under Captain Ian Hendrie, son of Sir John S. Hendrie, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. Gunner Murray sustained bullet wounds in both feet and was laid low in the "big gun" in which the Canadians figured so prominently outside Ypres.

**Who Will Be Warden?**  
 Now that the election of John E. Peart, as Reeve of Barton, has been settled, the topic for discussion among the county councillors has turned to the question of the probable warden. For some time it looked as if the Liberal representative of Glanville, would be the man for the place, without any opposition. But the Conservatives, who have the majority in the council, are now moving in the direction of Reeve Peart, and there will certainly be a stern fight at the opening session of the council, a week from next Tuesday. If the Conservatives stick together, there will be nothing to it but Peart; but, as two of them have already pledged themselves to support Dickenson, the Barton man will have some opposition.

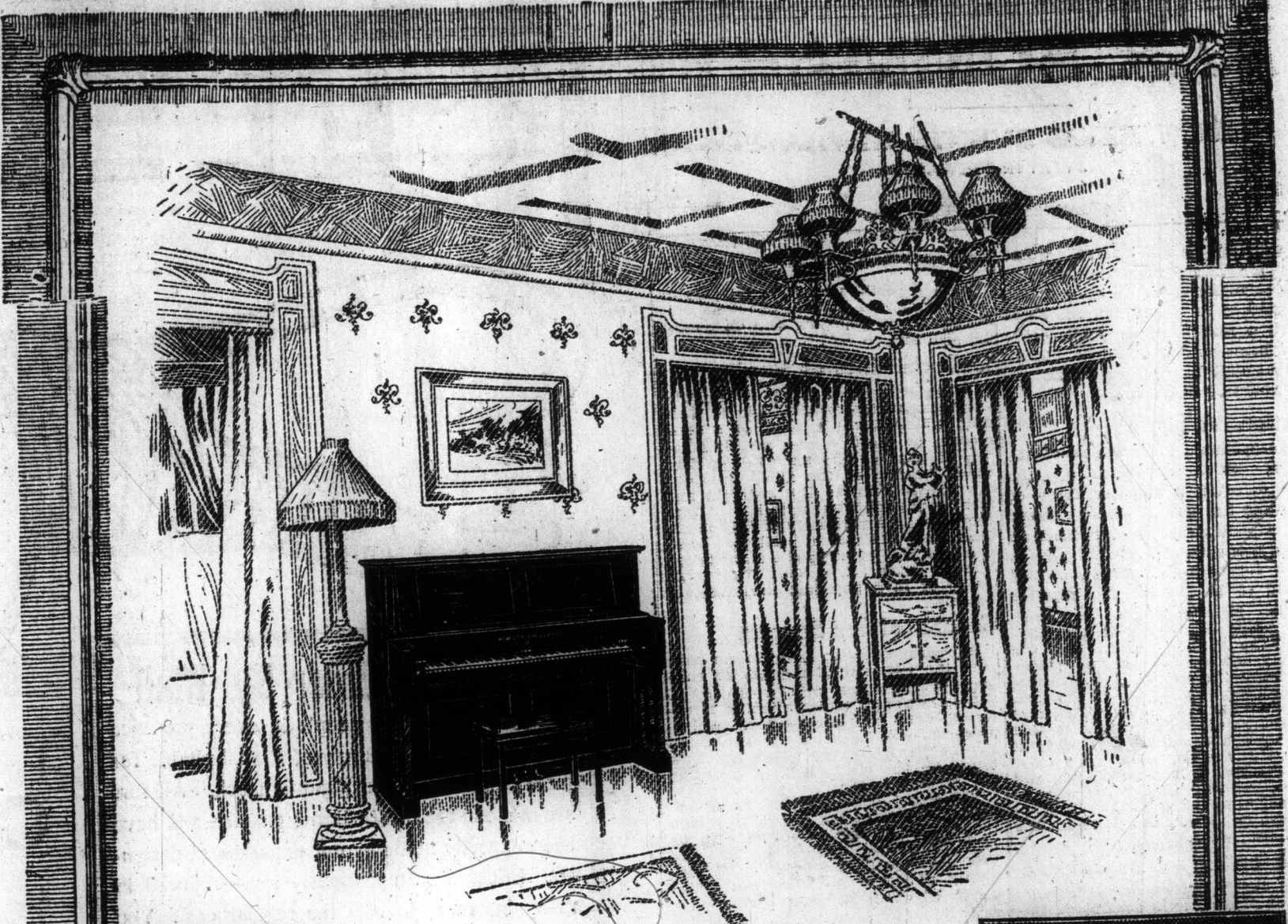
#### EMPEROR'S FAVORITE DIES ON A FARM

Emma Linden, a Noted Actress, Dies in Massachusetts—Friend of Dom Pedro.

Mrs. Emma Hawes Burke Johnson, who as Emma Linden, an actress, won the favor of Emperor Dom Pedro of Brazil many years ago and was for a time the sensation of that South American court, died Jan. 6 four miles outside Taunton, Mass., on an isolated farm on which she was born. She was forty-eight years old.  
 Emma Linden left the farm when sixteen years old and in Providence obtained an engagement in Keith's Museum. Later she traveled with the act and in Philadelphia met Mr. Balbriggan, another variety performer, whom she was married. Both learned the Spanish language from a press agent they employed and decided to go to South America. In Rio de Janeiro, while shopping, Miss Linden slipped and fell almost beneath the hoofs of the horses attached to the imperial carriage. The emperor himself assisted her to her feet, and then began an affair which brought worldwide attention upon Miss Linden until a revolution cost Dom Pedro the throne.  
 Miss Linden left the country when the storm broke and returned to the United States. Later she and Balbriggan returned to the former, to where he was killed in an explosion. His wife made her last appearance on a stage at Hoboken. She married a Mr. Burke, who died, and then wedded George H. Johnson, who survives her.
