FIVE THOUSAND SLAUGHTERED

Result of Battle Between Troops and Mutineers AT SEBASTOPOL

Situation in Russia is Very Alarming-- St. Petersburg Post Office to Close This Afternoon When Communication With Outer World Will Cease.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 30--2:15 p.m. The situation is very alarming. Russia is a complete blank so far as direct news is concerned.

WARSAW, Nov. 30--The deadlock in the postal and telegraph services between Warsaw and the interior of Russia is practically complete.

PARIS, Nov. 30--George L. Von Meyer, the American ambassador to Russia, who is here on his way to St. Petersburg, is giving close attention to the renewal of the gravity of the Russian situation.
