(2).—THE REV. WILLIAM BROOKMAN'S REPORT.

To the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society.

London, Ontario, April, 1868.

DEAR SIRS, -Once more the pleasing duty devolves upon me, as your Agent, of reporting upon the various branches of the Society in my District, comprising 10 large counties, 5 of which if divided would still make 10 counties of no mean dimensions. About 4,000 miles were travelled in going simply from branch to branch, sometimes more than once, in filling over 145 appointments, without counting the miles which are travelled in going home and returning to work, so that the actual distance traversed the last two years, since my appointment to this District, has averaged about 10,000 miles yearly. I also preached the Word last year about 150 times. And here, as the long vista of journeys and labours arise before my view, permit me to express my deep thankfulness to Almighty God for the watchful care and blessing extended to his servant during another year's work in His great cause. May we all ever experience the truth
