

HOW TAX MONEY WILL BE USED IS SET FORTH

Percentage of Allotment to Various Services in City and County

Now that the assessment for 1926 has been filed in the assessors' office the staff is preparing to send out the tax bills. A study of the percentage of taxes going to the various purposes shows increases in some and reductions in others. In the amount for county purposes there is an increase in the percentage allotted to contingencies and debenture interest, and decrease in the percentages for board of health and General Public Hospital.

In the city increases are noted in the allotment for streets, fire, police, ferry and schools, and decreases in the amounts for grants and debenture interest. The largest increase is in schools, which this year will be \$124,000 and last year for 98 cents. Of the amount for schools this year about 10 1/2 cents is for the vocational school.

WOMAN AUTHOR, 65, COMMITTS SUICIDE

Leaves Unfinished Book Regarding
Young Girl, Self-slayer;
Drinks Lysol

BOONTON, N. J., June 22.—Mrs. Kate Jordan Vernily, author and playwright, who has been hurrying to complete a novel dealing with a girl who committed suicide, left the house of her niece, Mrs. George A. Reeder, in Mountain Lake, and took her own life by swallowing lysol, in a clump of scrub pine. The body was discovered by the Mountain Lake Police.

Mrs. Vernily was 65 years old and she had been suffering from insomnia and high blood pressure, and was considerably fretted by the book she was writing.

Mrs. Vernily, who wrote under the name of K. Brown, was born in Dublin, Ireland. Her better known books include "A Circle in the Sky," "The House of the Living," "Creeping Tides," "Against the Wind," "The Next Corner," and "The House of the Living." Her best known play was "Secret Strings."
