Lynch, the president, in the chair. Rev. James Cloran, C.S.S.R., rector of St. Peter's, was present and spoke to the members.

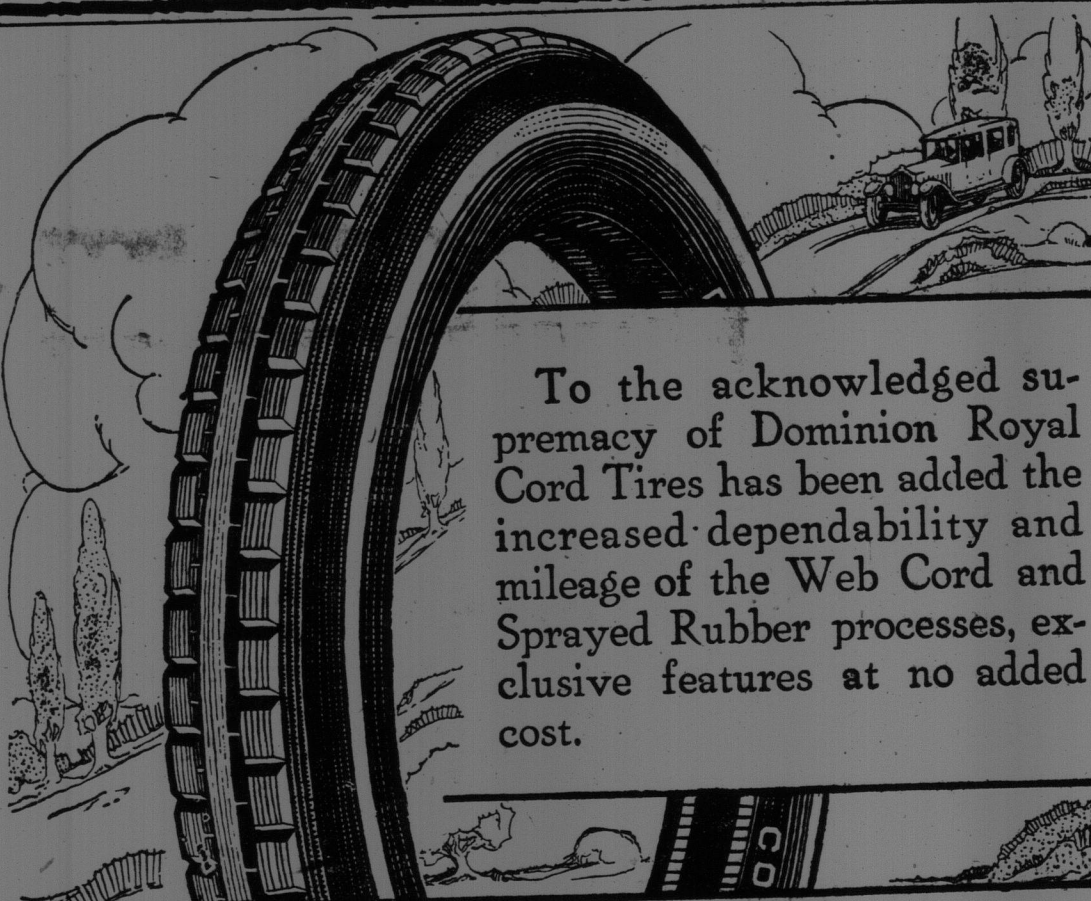

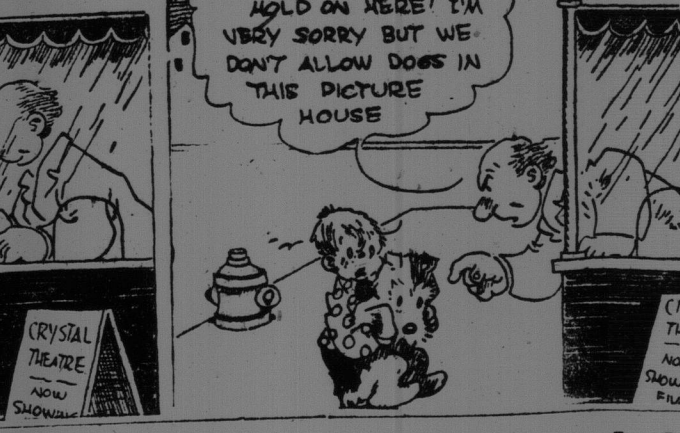

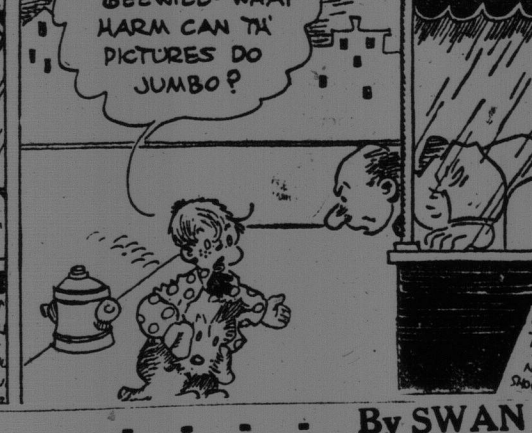
