At Least Seven Champions in Number After Recent Shows.

Fourteen St. John dogs arrived home by express today, and at least seven are entitled to the honor prefix "Champion" to their names. These local winners were shown at both dog shows of the Nova Scotia and Pictou County Kennel Clubs in the care of Robt. B. Laskey.

The new champions include: Thos. Bingham's Newfoundland, "Rover"; Geo. McA. Bland's pointer, "Jiggs Flash"; G. B. Taylor's Irish setter, "Queer Isabella"; W. Geo. Gray's Irish terrier, "Worse Red Hot"; Jas. Whitehouse's parti-colored cocker, "Little Sister"; Robt. B. Laskey's smooth fox terrier, "Carlam"; and the same owner's champion "Crown Ajax" completed his second championship.

With these local dogs were a nice brace of Ormsby wire fox terriers, "Snowball" and "Wild Rose," which also finished for the same honors.

About 20 silver trophies and special prizes were awarded these dogs. Other exhibitors who were awarded winners ribbons and variety medals included: Robt. Orr's splendid pointer bitch "Viny Ridge"; G. B. Taylor's fine setter "Barney Byng"; which won several medals at Halifax and the same owner's "Queen Isabella" winning best of the Irish setter breed at New Glasgow two days ago. W. Geo. Three Issues Register New High Levels for 1924 Business.

New York, Sept. 27.—Stock prices moved irregularly higher at the opening of today's market with further accumulations noted in the low priced rails and public utilities. New 1924 highs were established in the first few minutes of trading by Frisco common and U. S. East Iron Pipe and Consolidated Gas of Baltimore, while Brooklyn Union Gas and American Tobacco each opened a point higher.
