

MUSICIANS OF CITY WIN PRAISE FOR RADIO WORK

City Cornet Gets Wire From Mrs. Calvin Coolidge

GOOD CONCERT

Messages of Congratulation Received by Performers From Many Places

The radio concert broadcast last evening from CNRA at Moncton by the City Cornet Band of St. John and other musicians, was a splendid success if the flood of congratulatory telegrams received from all parts of the Maritime Provinces, Upper Canada and places in the United States are any method of judging. A message from Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, wife of the President of the United States, was received, one of the local artists said this morning, in which she declared that the concert was being heard excellently to all those taking part.

St. John Performers

The programme was largely made up of St. John talent and the members of the City Cornet Band and the others from here left yesterday at noon and returned early this morning. They report that they were royally treated by the C. N. R. The programme included solos by Mrs. C. O. Morse, Miss Vera Terris, Fred Joyce and Harold Gillis; quartette, Messrs. Charles Stackhouse, W. Gramann, Harold Gillis and Felix McMullin; duet, Mrs. C. O. Morse and Mr. Joyce; six selections by the band, two of them solos by David Higgins, with band accompaniment, and the four others instrumental numbers.

Soon after the programme started, one of those who took part said this morning, messages commenced to pour in from Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, Montreal, various parts of New Brunswick, and several places in United States. There were not many messages received from this city it was learned.

Some Interference

Several local radio fans were complaining this morning that they were unable to tune in on the Moncton concert last night. A great deal of local interest was aroused over the concert owing to the popularity of the band and the others who were taking part. A few incidents have been found where fans report that they were able to hear considerably more of the programme than this, but the majority were sadly disappointed.
