

# DIVORCES ARE GETTING TOO MANY FOR THE SENATE

**Committee Chairman Urges  
Courts for Ontario and for  
Quebec— Ontario Applica-  
tions 105, Quebec 8.**

Ottawa, June 21.—(Canadian Press.)—The first session of the divorce committee of the senate for the present session, Hon. W. F. P. Wilson, minister of justice, announced today that action be taken next session to establish divorce courts for Ontario and Quebec. He said that in the meantime divorce applications would continue to increase and the work was getting behind. He said that the jurisdiction of the divorce law was not confined to the wealthy classes and, enumerating the occupations of the applicants, he said that the more prevalent among the other classes was that of the unemployed.

For the present session there had been 111 applications for divorce. Of these, 104 were granted and 118 presented to the senate. The committee heard 104 petitions, received 111 applications, and 118 were withdrawn and eight not prosecuted.

Of petitions heard sixty-three were granted, 111 were refused and 118 were withdrawn. Of the 111 granted, 105 wives. Ontario furnished 105 applications and Quebec eight.

The number was fifty-five, while in 1920 there were 100, last year 111 and this year 102.
