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MAIL IS ROUGH ON LLOYD GEORGE

Charges Attempt to Make Future Sure in New Party

Speaks of "Plot" and Says Premier is Opposed by Strong Forces — Says Some M. P.'s Declare Labor Distrustful of Him.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Jan. 13.—The Daily Mail repeats its allegation of January 6 that Premier Lloyd George is attempting to secure his political future by the formation of a new centre party of which he would assume the leadership. It connects with its statement an article by Lord Chancellor Birkenhead in the Weekly Dispatch of Sunday, in which the chancellor suggested the immediate formation of a national party, including the Unionists and the remnants of the Liberal organization, to present an effective front to the Laborites. The Daily Mail asserts that this article "has revealed clearly the great light which is destined to be the chief political issue for many weeks and to determine the future of the political parties."

Describing the alleged move as a "plot" the paper continues: "Realizing that the coalition as it exists is doomed to an early end, the premier seeks to establish himself at the head of the Unionist party, to capture the Unionist party machine. The forces opposed to him are strong. Few, if any, coalition Liberals would join him under the banner of a new national party, nor will any labor members of parliament join the new movement. Experienced members of parliament remarked at the railway men's meeting last week that one of the main obstacles to acceptance of the government's terms was labor's distrust of the premier, the delegates declaring that he was a pure opportunist and that they did not know from day to day what his policy would be. Whatever the name of the new party, it must be composed of Unionists."

The newspaper says that most of the younger active Unionists are opposed to the premier's "plot" for several reasons, including his recent declaration at Manchester that he is a free trader of the old school, and that he is endeavoring to overcome their hostility in an extensive political intrigue in progress behind the scenes. "In order to succeed," says the Daily Mail, "the plotters must make the Unionist members of parliament and the Unionist peers to agree to their plans, and also must secure the support in general of the Unionist party at a conference to be held next week. It is extremely doubtful if they can succeed in either of these objects."

WITNESS BOX TOO SMALL FOR HER Fat Woman and Tattooed Girl Called in Montreal Case.

Montreal, Jan. 13.—When Emma Russ, a "fat woman" who was one of the attractions at a "muséum" on 95 Lawrence street, was called as a witness in a case of Leon Gervais yesterday, it was found she could not get into the box, which has a floor space of one square yard, and the entrance to which is thirty inches. The attorneys in order to break and the court hurriedly decided to hear her evidence from the floor. She weighs 350 pounds. Julia Clarke, a tattooed woman, also gave evidence. The case is one of alleged assault by the police on Leon Gervais in the course of a raid on the "muséum," because a three card game was, it is alleged, being carried on there.

THE RAILWAY SITUATION IN THE MOTHERLAND

London, Jan. 13.—Sir Eric Geddes, the minister of transportation and, Sir Robert Horne, minister of labor, returned last night from Paris, where they conferred with Premier Lloyd George on the situation created by the railway employees' rejection of the British government wage proposals. After a cabinet meeting, at which an attempt will be made to decide the government's attitude, Sir Eric and Sir Robert will meet with the presidents of the railwaymen. Delegates representing the railway employees' union at a meeting yesterday decided by a large majority to accept the government's proposal for representation of the men on the railway advisory committee.

GREAT HUNTING RESERVES OF LATE RULER FOR SALE

Geneva, Jan. 13.—The hunting estates and lodges of the late Emperor Francis Joseph in the Tyrol are advertised for sale. The emperor considered these the finest in Europe and kept a record of his bags from 1858 to 1890. The game killed numbered 45,128, and included 1,570 chamois, 807 stags, 922 deer, 1,977 foxes, 14,175 pheasants, 4,270 partridges, and 41 bear. King Edward and the former German Emperor are credited with important bags. English and American sportsmen are after the purchase of the royal hunting grounds, which are the private property of the Hapsburgs. The money thereafter will be handed over to the Hapsburgs by the government.

Harvard Men Near To The Danger Line

Strong Talk About the Raids on Reds

Commissioner of Immigration Says He Will "Get" the Harvard Liberal Club If He Can—Would Give Him Great Pleasure.

(Special to The Times.) Boston, Jan. 13.—What is known as the Harvard Liberal Club, whose views several times have stopped short of the danger line in denunciation of what it calls free speech throttling, had a senate last night, though it was not in the shadow of the university but at the City Club rooms. Some of the speakers said that democracy in America was endangered and the Red menace exaggerated as the outgrowth of the war. Judge Anderson, of the United States District Court, and cleared that the hysterical roundup of Reds had no more foundation in fact than the German plot propaganda, more than ninety-nine per cent of which was fictitious. He said: "It is a depressing, almost appalling, fact that as an aftermath of one war to make the world safe for democracy real democracy now seems unsafe in America."

"Now most of the fear out of which perhaps dangerous limitations of this precious right are being advocated, is, in my opinion, almost groundless. Many, perhaps most, of the agitators for the suppression of the so-called Red menace are the same individuals or class of forces that in '17 and '18 were frightening the community to death about pro-German plots. Rev. Dr. Crothers, of Cambridge, who has been very vehement in his denunciation of the Red menace, has been convicted of an act of anarchy that covered political offences. It is time also to turn the big problem of the time, and not by trying by cheap fulminations to crush out the exhausted honest thought."

Prof. Chafetz, who draws a salary from Harvard, relieved himself of this "Men and women have been convicted and imprisoned who were opposed to militarism. Is it wise to exclude aliens in view of the reputation of our country as an asylum for the oppressed? We first try to settle Russia by sending in Admiral Kolchak; now we are trying to settle it by sending in General Gaidar. We are likely to decrease our discontent by dragging men away from their families. How many of the relatives and friends of these men are likely to remain loyal to our government? The action taken against many of these men arrested and let out again has brought out the government into hatred, ridicule and contempt on their part."

Attorney-General Allen said: "I do not assume we have the right to deport undesirable aliens, but if we deport one alien and leave behind ten members of his family vowing vengeance on our government, we may ask ourselves if we have gained anything by sending away one violent anarchist and making ten more who remain. The best cure is education."

FRANCE TO STOP WORK ON HER FIVE DREADNOUGHTS

Paris, Jan. 13.—Steps were taken by the cabinet today to stop the construction of the five dreadnoughts of the Normandie class, laid down just before the war, but not completed. Premier Millerand was authorized to introduce a bill for this purpose. Other measures authorized will direct that the six acute cruisers provided for by the law of 1912, as well as twelve scout destroyers, shall be laid down during 1920. The plans for the Normandie class of dreadnoughts provided for vessels displacing 25,200 tons each, with main batteries of 12-inch 13.4 inch guns and twenty-four 5.5 inch guns.

SAYS ELECTIONS WILL HOLD GOOD (Special to Times.)

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—Hon. Charles Doherty, minister of justice, says that there is nothing in the contention of Alex. Muir that certain members of parliament elected in by-elections held last year are illegally elected. He says that the year time election act was not repealed or suspended. Parliament decided not to hold by-elections under the year time election act but passed a new act, the by-elections act of 1919, and that was inconsistent with the wartime election act it repealed it.

PREDICTS AN EPIDEMIC OF HICCUGHS

Whinnipeg, Jan. 13.—An epidemic of hiccoughs will be the next thing to sweep across the continent, in fact the disease has already appeared in mild form here, according to Dr. Gordon Bell, provincial sanitarian.

PROHIBITION Opinion on State Legislatures Cancelling Ratification of Amendment.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 13.—State legislatures cannot under the law repeal ratification of the constitutional prohibition amendment, Wayne B. Wheeler, counsel for the anti-saloon league, declared today in a statement discussing recommendations for repeal made to the law makers of New York, by the governor of that state. Chief Justice Marshall was quoted by Mr. Wheeler as follows:—"The principle is asserted that one legislature is competent to repeal an act which a former legislature was competent to pass. The correctness of this principle so far as respects general legislation can never be controverted. But if an act be done under a law, a succeeding legislature cannot undo it. The past cannot be recalled by the most absolute power."

Paris, Jan. 13.—(Havas)—Northern and Eastern France are being swept by a violent storm, reports stating that three persons have been killed and twelve injured. Heavy damage is reported from various cities, numerous buildings having been blown down. Telegraph and telephone communications have suffered considerably.
