**Sidelights On Sport**

In the St. John League last evening St. Peter's increased their lead by defeating the Y. M. C. I. The St. Peter's regular infield was badly broken up, but the substitutes played well. No fewer than fourteen free passes were handed out. The cause of this is largely due to the pitching mound. A large hole is dug directly in front of the plate and a pitcher holding one foot on the rubber, which the rule forces him to do, goes to the hole when he is delivering the ball, and as a result is off his balance. The man in charge should see that the hole is filled in. If this is not done the umpire should force all pitchers to stand on the plate and not in front of it, and action would then have to be taken. It not only causes pitchers to throw wild, but endangers the batters, who are apt to be struck on the head or near the heart with a fast one.

Ball players as well as fans are prone to blame the wrong man when a home is pulled. Last night St. Peter's had three men on and the batter struck out the catcher for the Y. M. C. I., dropping the third strike.

The batter is automatically out and the base runners may remain on the bags. Last night the runner on first started for second and was hit by the ball to first, which was the right play, as the runners on second and third held their bases. Britt started to get the runner advancing to second and then changed the play, and worked to try and get the man off third. While doing so the runner advancing to second, turned and dashed back towards first and Britt threw to Mooney, who was standing near first. The latter threw home to head off a runner, but the throw was wide and all were safe.
