THE FRENCH CATHOLIC VIEW IS THAT CANADA SHOULD AID BRITAIN

'A Duty We Are Willing to Fulfill to End,' Says L'Action Sociale—Reply To Bourassa

Quebec, Sept. 17.—That Canada should give effective aid to Great Britain in the present war is the advice given to Canadians by "L'Action Sociale," organ of the Catholic Church in Canada, in answer to Mr. Bourassa's articles against the participation of Canada in the war. The paper says: "Our loyalty to England is not only a state of our mind and a disposition of the national will that honors us, but it is a duty that we are willing to fulfill truly to the end. Does this duty of loyalty now obligate us to give our effective aid to the Mother Country in this great struggle in which she is engaged for the safeguard of its interests and for the defence of right and civilization? We do not hesitate to answer openly, yes."

"What must be this effective aid? It must be reasonable, but it seems to us that it must be determined by the motherland—as she is judge without appeal—measured by the extent of her needs and means, as she holds the authority of the sovereignty and the safeguard of the general interests of the whole empire."

LONDON AGAIN JOYFUL. Theatres and Hotels Doing Big Business.

London, Sept. 17.—With the tide of battle favoring the allies, London is in a jubilant frame of mind. According to hotel men, the demand for expensive food and drink is one result. When the war started some fashionable hotels began to serve plain, cheap food, and there was little protest, but with the higher spirits resulting from the defeat of the

Germans has come a demand for more expensive dishes. The theatres where successful productions are being staged are attracting big audiences, and more sanguine managers predict a good season despite the war, if the allies' successes continue.

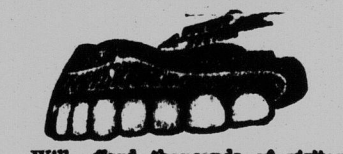

MOTORS MAKE DEAR TEA, SAYS LONDON PAPER.

Tea, all except China, has gone up in price from two-pence to fourpence a pound since this time last year. The finest Indian has gone up fourpence, ordinary Indian and Ceylon teas two-pence a pound.

The reason, curious as it may seem, is the fact that more and more people are buying motor-cars every year. Briak selling in the motor world means a growing demand for rubber for wheel tyres. This led in the time of the rubber boom to a sharp rise in the price of rubber. It so happens that rubber and tea are two crops that require exactly the same conditions of soil and climate, with the result that ever since the beginning of the rubber boom more and more tea planters have dropped tea for rubber. The effect of the shorter supplies of tea is just beginning to be felt in the present rise of price.

So that is why our tea is dear. If your tea merchant is not raising his price he is giving you poorer quality for your money. The cost of your cup of tea is going to rise further, too.

BRING ENGLISH BOYS AND GIRLS TO NEW BRUNSWICK

(Gleaner).

Rev. E. M. Cook, head of the Shrewsbury Boys' Club, of Liverpool, England, is in the city and in company with A. B. Wilnot, dominion immigration agent in this city, is inspecting conditions in and about Fredericton for placing of immigrant boys and girls.

The Shrewsbury Boys' Club, of which Rev. Mr. Cook is the head, has sent immigrants to Canada during the last few years. The club supplies the members with transportation and expenses and they refund this money on receiving permanent employment in this country. The greater number of the boys sent to this country by the Shrewsbury Club have gone to the west, and in nearly all cases they have been successful in Canada.

"I am very favorably impressed with conditions in New Brunswick," and Rev. Mr. Cook to a reporter, "and will endeavor to have some come to this province on my return to England."

Rev. Mr. Cook, in company with Mr. Wilnot, and A. W. Hay, of Woodstock, dominion immigration official and chairman of the Farm Settlement Board, will leave tomorrow on an inspection trip in Carleton County. This will give Rev. Mr. Cook an opportunity of seeing the kind of homes some of the immigrants have obtained in this province. He has been here for a month and will return to England in the latter part of September. He is a brother of Rev. William Cook, of Belmont, Sunbury County.
