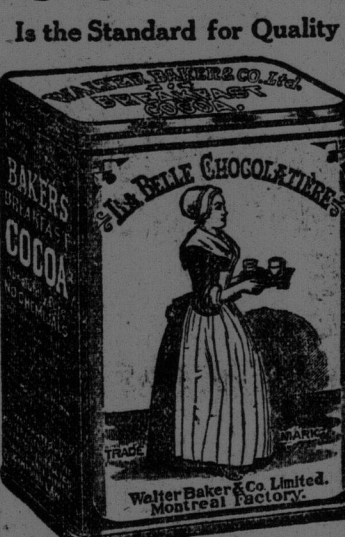

## GREAT BOOM NIGHT FOR ST. JOHN

in St. John, and Mr. Pidgeon said that recently he went to him in regard to buying his St. John property, and he found that it had increased in value in a much greater proportion than had his taxes. He spoke of the booming ideas of the west and thought that the people of this city who had greater advantages than any of the western towns, should take up the opportunities here.

He said that St. John would soon have natural gas as Mathew Lodge had told him that natural gas would be piped into St. John within a year. The pipe line at present would only be 10 miles long, and when the supply was tapped at Sussex there would be only 40 miles to pipe it. In the west, natural gas was carried 200 and 300 miles, and in the United States in one case, 600 miles.

He knew of an industry that would locate here at a cost of \$1,200,000, and that \$200,000 had been reserved for a gas producer plant, but when he received the statement from Mr. Lodge, he had informed the promoters of the new industry and this item had been cut out of the estimates as, natural gas would be much better than the gas producer product.

Refreshments were served during the evening. The chairman conveyed the thanks of those present to the Royal Hotel, which donated cigars.

Besides the speeches there were several musical numbers, including the following: C. A. Munro, W. H. Allen, Senor Monetta of the Nickel Theatre, and Fred McNamara of the Pollard Opera Company.

Each singer had to respond to an encore. The entertainment closed with the singing of God Save The King.

### THE LATE MRS. A. D. FOREST.

A Vancouver letter in the Bangor Commercial says:—"The many friends of Mrs. A. D. Forest of Vancouver, Me., were pained to learn of her death in the Chipman hospital, St. Stephen, N. B., where she went for an operation. Mrs. Forest was born in Napan, N. B., with a twin brother in 1854, and was a daughter of the late John Dickson. She was united in marriage with A. D. ### THE MIKADO TODAY

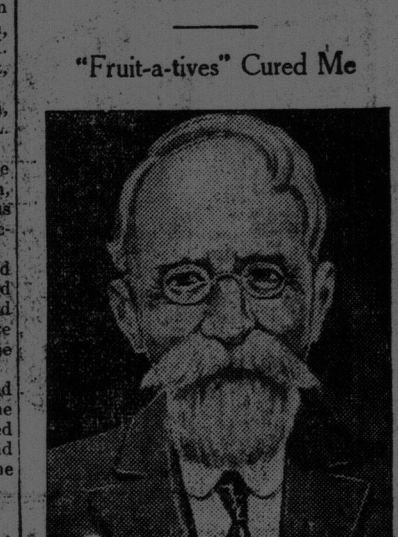
