**BISHOP CONFIRMS RUMOR**

**His Lordship Bishop Casey Has Been Appointed Archbishop of Vancouver — Father LeBlanc His Successor**

The report that His Lordship Bishop Casey has been appointed archbishop of the diocese of Vancouver, B. C., is correct. The bishop confirmed the news this morning when he was asked by a Times reporter as to the truth of it. Further than that he said, he was unable to state at present.

The announcement of his appointment has brought mingled regret and rejoicing to the members of the Catholic church. Not only in the cathedral and other churches in St. John but in the other districts of his diocese as well, it was felt that it would necessitate his departure from St. John, and pleasure that the honor of his higher clerical office had been bestowed upon him will be felt.

Bishop Casey succeeded to the control of the diocese of St. John some years ago on the death of Bishop Sweeney, and has capably and successfully administered the affairs of the church in these parts since that time, proving that the selection of the Holy See was wisely made. During the time he has been bishop he increased the love and respect cherished towards him while he was priest, and he has won the esteem of all in his charge, and the highest regard from those of other denominations. He has taken a prominent part in many matters of public interest, and his emphatic pronouncement and agitation against intemperance was one phase of his policy which has had far-reaching effect.

He is still in the prime of life and his appointment to the position of archbishop of such an important and extensive diocese in Vancouver is a distinct mark of the merit and esteem with which he is regarded by those in high authority in the church. His successor here is to be Rev. Father LeBlanc, who has been parish priest at St. Bernard's, Digby, N. S., for some time. Previous to his being stationed there he was parish priest at Salmon River for a time and also at Caledonia, Queen's county. He is a French-Canadian by birth and has had a bright record as a priest. He is a graduate of Church Point College, Digby. It is not known when the bishop will remove to the west nor when his successor will take office, but it is thought that it will not be for a few weeks at least.

**ALLOTMENT OF WEST SIDE BERTHS FOR THE WINTER SEASON**

**Recommended by Commissioner—Change in Wharfage Rate—Sewerage Extension for Douglas Avenue and Adelaide Road**

At the regular weekly meeting of the council this afternoon a number of important matters were brought before the commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands reports that he has had applications for berths at Sand Bay, for the steamship companies and recommends the allotment of berths to the C. P. R., Donalson line and Manchester line. It is also recommended by the commissioner of water and sewerage that the sewer be laid in Douglas avenue and Adelaide road in conjunction with the water extension on those sections. The reports follow:

The commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands recommends that berths be laid out on the west side of the harbor, between the Douglas and Adelaide roads, for the use of the C. P. R., Donalson line and Manchester line. It is also recommended by the commissioner of water and sewerage that the sewer be laid in Douglas avenue and Adelaide road in conjunction with the water extension on those sections.
