ACTIVE OPERATIONS

ALL WINTER IN CAPE BRETON MINES Dominion Coal Company Plan To Raise More Than Half a Million Tons

The Cape Breton Gazette says that the Dominion Coal Company's operations will be operated all winter to a greater extent than ever has been the case in that season. Last winter they banked about 400,000 tons; this winter it will be more than half a million tons. The principal reason for the continuation of winter operations during the coming winter is the fact that the company now has in its employ more than 10,000 men, and in order to keep this trained and effective force upon the job, and to do away with the mobilization of another force in the spring, it is intended to operate its mines continually during the winter, except when prevented from doing so by storms. The cost of continuous winter operations will be considerably higher than the summer working, but the management hopes that the cost will be more than offset by the fact that the company will have a trained force of employees working in the spring. This year's monthly output has been very large. The average has been 396,000 tons a month, and it is expected now that the output will reach the mark hoped for early in the year—4,000,000 tons. This will be an increase of 400,000 tons over last year.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Arthur Holland, of Concord, Mass., has been chosen president of the Bangor and Aroostook Railway, to succeed F. W. Orem, resigned. Frank Raffello was yesterday sentenced to hang in Sherbrooke, Que., for the murder of Camello Cherabino. An end to the war between Turkey and Italy was arrived at yesterday. The ambassadors of peace signed the provisional treaty calling for the laying down of arms. Definitive terms of the treaty will be announced in a few days.

The line of defence in the Becker trial in New York is apparently an endeavor to have shown that a gambler's plot and not police officials was responsible for the murder of Herman Rosenthal. J. F. McKeown, counsel for Police Lieutenant Babop, yesterday questioned Sam Shepps along lines suggesting that the gambler was killed through a plot formed by his associates, because he had "squealed."

The wedding of Miss Ruby Hughes, daughter of Hon. Sam Hughes, minister of militia, to Douglas M. Green, of the New York branch of the Bank of Montreal, will take place on Saturday in Lindsay, Ont. The application of Armanca Laverge, the young nationalist leader, to be sent to the Balkans as Canadian military attaché, watching the military operations of the Balkan states in the war against Turkey, has been favorably received and he expects to leave in a few days. An English speaking officer probably will be sent still at large.




