EXTRAVAGANCE IS SCORED BY MEETING

Methodist Conference Urges Thrift and Commercial Integrity.

Sackville, June 15.—That lavish spending and luxurious self-indulgence were sins against God and man; that thrift and commercial integrity in the individual were the only basis for an honest life, public or private, prohibition could be advanced only by the election of legislators who would enforce the law, were among the sentiments endorsed by the N. B. and E. I. Methodist conference in considering the report of its special committee. Reporting a gross increase of 1,000 members with a net increase of 881, the conference committee on the state the work recommend plans for increased success. Increased budget for ministerial education was accepted by Conference in order to realize new standard for ministers.

Church Union was brought to the fore Saturday by the general superintendent, Rev. D. D. Chown, who addressed the conference and put it in possession of the latest information concerning the present outlook for the union bill at Ottawa. At the conclusion of his address Dr. Chown requested the conference to appoint a special committee with whom he might consult concerning representations which should immediately be made to Ottawa with a view of supporting the endeavor which were being made by unionists in all the churches to persuade Parliament to exercise its prerogative and pass the union bill without amendment, thus forestalling litigation in which, he said, law possibilities of wreck to the union movement on pure technicalities.

Social Service.

Recommendations in the report of the committee on social service which had been passed before conference adjourned charged much of the present industrial and commercial depression which had not yet passed to the unethical inflation of values and gambling in land, oil and minerals which disgraced the period immediately preceding the war, and to the titanic wastefulness of the war period. The church the report said, must do all in its influence against the return of such conditions.

It must insist in the presence of so much unemployment in our land, and in view of conditions of famine and death in many lands lavish spending on self and indulgence in luxury so insistently pressed upon us by scientific advertising is a sin against God and man.

For An Honest Life.

Thrift and commercial integrity in the individual are the only basis for an honest life, public or private. The national debt and the unstable conditions of many industries requires an emphasis by the conference upon such prohibitions in the church discipline, as those against borrowing without the probability of paying or taking up goods without a probability of paying for them. The church should so definitely direct its influence against this modern dishonest self-indulgence as will assist the return of those living conditions where confidence and good will shall strengthen the bond of unity between the various classes of society.

Prohibition.

In its findings as to prohibition the committee asked the conference to second the profound sense of dissatisfaction with the present administration of the law and laxity of most of the officials throughout the province who were entrusted with the law's enforcement. Conference approved and is making provision for seeking the cooperation of the Methodist people in electing to Parliament such men as will enforce the law.

Sunday Sermons.

Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather the auditorium of the church was well filled at 11 o'clock. Rev. Dr. Chown preached a surprising sermon which thrilled the hearts of the congregation.

Ordination.

Mason Sheffield Linton was presented to the General Superintendent by Secretary Holmes for ordination as a minister. Following the charge Mr. Linton addressed the congregation, relating his Christian experience and his

reasons for seeking ordination to the ministry.

Dr. Chown and the officers of the conference participated in the laying on of hands. Morton L. Harrison, of Centenary church, St. John, with which church Mr. Linton had been associated for many years in lay work, was called forward, and with a few fitting remarks conveyed to the newly ordained minister the congratulations of Centenary church, and their high hopes for his future usefulness. Mr. Harrison presented the young minister a purse of St. money as a tangible symbol of the sentiments which the congregation had sent him to express. At the Sunday school celebration, in the afternoon, addresses were given by Rev. E. Val Dillon, of Moncton, and Rev. A. W. Brown, of Newcastle.

Conference got through with a considerable number of further reports. The station sheet complete in detail was read to the conference by Rev. D. R. Chown, secretary of the committee, its adoption by conference was official confirmation of the stations.

Presiding officers of the eight conference districts for the current year where then elected by the ballot. The appointments are as follows: St. John district, Rev. H. G. Fulton; Fredericton district, Rev. F. A. Wightman; Sackville district, Rev. Prof. W. G. Watson; Chatham district, Rev. H. C. Rice; St. Stephen district, Rev. George M. Young; Woodstock district, Rev. D. H. Chown; Charlottetown district, Rev. Henry Pierce; Summerside district, Rev. George Ayers.

Rev. A. D. McLeod's report for committee on finance and Christian stewardship reminded the conference that \$188,000 worth of church property had been destroyed by fire last year. Stress was laid by conference in adopting committee's report upon the importance of adequate insurance and watchfulness against fire.

Eastport, Me., June 15.—The Canadian fishermen have won their fight for \$10 as the minimum price per hoghead for herring sold to the Maine sardine factories, the factories agreeing to that price on Friday following the action of the Canadian Department of Marine and Fisheries in inserting a clause in the fishermen's licenses making \$10 a hoghead the minimum price for sardine herring sold for export.

In April the fishermen were getting \$12 a hoghead, but in May the factories dropped the price to \$6.
