A FIGHT FOR LIFE

Condemned Murderer Reprieved in Sight of Gallows.

SPECIAL MESSENGER SENT

Frank Capelle, Condemned to Hang To-Day, Secures Two Weeks' Stay of Execution—Counsel Will Apply for New Trial—New Evidence to Be Added—Messenger Raced Against Time.

Toronto, Aug. 1.—The death sentence to have been executed on Frank Capelle at Port Arthur this morning was postponed by reprieve until Aug. 15, granted by Judge Britton at noon yesterday. This is the first time such a reprieve has been granted by a judge who did not try the case.

The application was made by O. A. Moss as agent for F. H. Keefer, of Port Arthur, counsel for the prisoner. Capelle was found guilty at the last Parry Sound Assizes of the murder of one Dow and was sentenced by Judge Teetzel to be hanged on Aug. 15.

A special messenger, Mr. Hugh Hoyle, was immediately dispatched to Port Arthur with the order of postponement.

The ground on which Mr. Keefer based his application was that he could produce evidence not heard at the trial. Capelle was sentenced which he claims would change the verdict of any jury from death to manslaughter.

Capelle was indicted jointly with Engnie Marano. The latter was acquitted. Mr. Keefer also claims that he can produce evidence in connection with the tragedy, who was ill at the time of the trial, whose evidence will show that the death of Dow resulted out of a drunken row in which Capelle was struck on the head where he had been previously injured.

The shortness of the time between the trial and the date of the execution was due to his not having been advised of the result of his application for clemency from the Crown until July 29, the day he made application.

Capelle will be remanded back in custody until the 15th, and an application for a new trial made.

FOR TRAINING SHIP

United States Make Application to Canada For Use on Great Lakes.

Ottawa, Aug. 1.—The United States Government has made another application for a training ship on the great lakes.

Some time ago an application was made and granted for a United States cruiser to go through the Canadian canals to be utilized as a training ship on Lake Erie. This has been the first time and ever alternate one.

While the United States has formally made the application to the Dominion, it is really from the State of New York, and made on behalf of the naval militia, with headquarters at Rochester. It is understood that the application will be granted.

There are no guns on these old cruisers, which are to be used as training ships. Whatever guns are required for the naval officers and crews will be kept ashore.
