## College Extension Lectures

### PRELIMINARY NOTICE

Courses of lectures covering the requirements of the Licentiate in Arts of the Council of Higher Education and of the second, or Sophomore year, in certain Canadian Universities, will be organized for the next Academic year, beginning October 1st, 1916, and ending April 30th, 1917. The following, and possibly other subjects will be included:—English, Mathematics, Latin, French, Physics, Chemistry, Geology and Mineralogy.

Candidates passing successfully through such of those courses of lectures as are required for the Second Year in Arts in the Universities, will be admitted as Third Year students in the Universities, provided they are otherwise qualified. Each of the lecture courses will be open to qualified students whether they have graduation in view or not.

For further information application should be made as early as possible to one of the Superintendents of Education. June 30, 1916.

## Times are Busy

### At Grand Falls

From Mr. N. W. Gillingham, of the A. N. D. Co., Ltd. staff, Grand Falls, who arrived in town from the paper city by Wednesday's express, we learn that just at present times are very busy at that place. Something over 200 men are engaged exclusively on construction work. Large additions are being made to the paper mills and when finished the output of paper and sulphite pulp will be considerably increased. A larger amount of wood will be cut this coming winter for the manufacture of paper than in former years, and beginning in October large gangs of men will be given employment at Badger and Milltown during the logging operations, and from present appearances the A. N. D. Co., Ltd. seems to be in a progressive condition. Mr. Gillingham, who has been looking after the company's interest here at St. John's and Heart's Content the past summer, leaves to-morrow morning for the latter place, where preparations will be made for winter shipments of paper and pulp from there. Additions will be made to the company's property at Heart's Content and it is expected that quite a large shipment will be sent out from there direct to England by the A.N.D. Co. Ltd. boats this coming winter.—Telegram, Sept. 15.

## Souvenirs

W. B. Frites, the American novelist, was among the neutral war correspondents within the German lines whom a group of German officers recently entertained at dinner.

The dinner went very well. The Germans were cordial to all the correspondents—to the Dutch and Swedish and Swiss and Balkan ones—but they were especially cordial to Mr. Frites.

At the dinner's end, however, in an impressive and perhaps preconcerted silence, a German officer rose and said:

"As a souvenir of this pleasant occasion, I am going to offer the American correspondent a slight gift, namely, these few splinters from an American made shell."

Mr. Frites accepted the shell splinters, laid them on the table before him, and bowed gravely. Then he took from his wallet a flattened bullet, evidently having anticipated some such incident.

"Not to be outdone by my generous and brave hosts," he said, "I would offer them a souvenir in return. It is this flattened bullet, one of the innumerable Krupp made bullets that were used by the Spaniards against my fellow countrymen in Cuba."

## Rioting At Chemnitz

London, Sept. 20.—Serious rioting in which a number of lives were lost occurred at Chemnitz Saturday, according to a despatch from the Hague. It says that rioting started when the news arrived of heavy losses of Chemnitz workmen in battle. Crowds assembled in the streets and sang the Internationale. They refused to disperse and were charged by Hussars. Five Hussars were killed and forty injured; and about forty civilians were killed, and 300 armed with revolvers were arrested.


