INDIANS DOING WELL.

Superintendent Vowell Found Northern Natives Well Advanced in Civilization.

A. W. Vowell, superintendent of Indian affairs in the province, who returned from Telegraph Creek a few days ago, reports that the Indians in that part of British Columbia are now quite well advanced in the way of adopting the customs of the whites. The greatest trouble the department has in connection with the administration of affairs there is the keeping of liquor away from the Indians. On Mr. Vowell's last trip some of the Indians came to him, and apparently thinking that they were far enough advanced to permit of a free use of intoxicants, asked the superintnedent if when they were sick it would not be permissable to have liquor so as to hasten their

Long experience with the Indians has taught Mr. Vowell how to deal with them. He quickly informed his suppliants that only in case they got very sick and the doctor advised a little would they be permitted to use liquor. The superintendent gave them warning that under any other circustances he heard of their obtaining liquor there would be

fore the Indians were forced to give up the idea that they could prescribe for their own ailments in the way anticipat-
