Tula, Russia, Nov. 15.—Count Leo Tolstoi is suffering from bronchitis, and, owing to a high fever, is in an extremely weak condition. A message from his daughter, Alexandra, who is nursing him at Astopova, giving this information, adds that the physicians say/ho immediate danger threatens. Tolstoi suffered from a se-twee attack of bronchitis in the winter of 1909 and as a result was readily susceptible to the disease again when he exposed himself to a long journey in the cold and rain.

The home of the station master at Astapova is quite comfortable and the patient is receiving skilful attention at the hands of Dr. Makowetsky, and one other physician, in addition to the loving care of his daughter, Newspaper correspondents, who are gathering around the little flag station, however, although not aggressive in their ratempts to secure the latest details, are hampering the attendants, and Alexandra has issued a request that her father be left in peace.

According to the official diagnosis of the physicians, Tolstoi is suffering from a catarrhal inflammation of the lower lobe of the left lung. His heart action is good. The maximum temperature today was 102, falling at times to 99, which is practically normal; pulse 104, dropping to 90; respiration fair. The physicians add that the expectoration and diruests are sufficient and that the patient has enjoyed tranquil, sleep, is in good pirits and is-resting quiety.
