



MILITARY NOTES AND NEWS

E. J. HEATT TURNS HIS

BUSINESS OVER TO HIS

SON AND JOINS 115TH

Business man sets ex-

ample young men might

well follow.

E. J. Heatt, proprietor of the Hy-

gienic Bakery, of this city, has turned

the management of his business over

to his son and enlisted as a private in

the ranks of the 115th. This action

on his part should stimulate recruiting

among the young men who have been

holding back up to this time.

Mr. Heatt is one of the best known

of the younger business men of the

city and is also a prominent society

man, being a member of Abdon Lodge

No. 1, A. F. and A. M., Gideon Lodge

No. 7, L.O.L., he is a Shriner and

member of the Sons of England. He is

secretary treasurer of the Sons of

England Band, which organization has

already sent twenty-two of its mem-

bers to the front. Mr. Heatt was

born at Ayton Station, Northampton-

shire, England, and came to this coun-

try in 1892, landing at Halifax, where

he was employed for about five years

in the Moire Limited. After leaving there

he came to St. John and was em-

ployed for a short time in the Bryden

Biscuit Works. About eighteen years

ago he started business for himself

and has been very successful having

built up the largest pastry business in

the city. Mr. Heatt is making this

sacrifice because he believes that the

time has come when it is the duty of

every man physically fit to shoulder

the rifle and do his bit to down this

devil of Prussian militarism.

In St. John some of the banks have

the programme arrangements for the

coming weeks reported satisfactory

progress.

Although indications early in the

season were that the lumber cut in

the province this year would be below

of previous years, the present

outlook is very bright. The province

reports received in the city that the

cut will be at least as great as that taken

from the province during the past

year. The absence of snow in the

northern section of the province in

the early winter and up to the past

two weeks had given rise to the be-

lief that there would be no opportu-

nity for extensive lumbering and the

outlook for getting out the cut was

none too hopeful. Reports from the

upper sections of the province are to

the effect that there is a good cover-

age of snow in the woods and the

operators are looking forward to an

exceptionally good season.

P. E. ISLAND MAN ONE OF

FOUR CANADIANS DEAD

IN SOUTH AMERICA

Thomas Morrison, well

known here, had advent-

urous career.

News has been received of the

deaths from yellow fever of four Can-

adian whites on a mining prospecting

tour of South America. Thomas Mor-

rison, son of John J. Morrison of

Georgetown, Roanoke, P. E. I., was

one of the victims of the deadly

scourge, and the rest were British

Colombians.

Morrison left home eight years ago

and settled in Prince Rupert as one

of the pioneers of that new town.

Three years ago he moved to Van-

couver and prospered in the real

estate development there. When the

real estate boom collapsed in that

city he and some of his friends fitted

up an expedition for South America

where they heard of a promising min-

ing venture in Southern Chili. They

were obliged to put into the port of

Buenos Ventura in the United States

of Colombia to have their vessel re-

paired and while there the yellow

fever broke out. Morrison and most

of his company contracted the dis-

ease, and three of his companions

succumbed.

Morrison was quite prominent in

Vancouver. He was well known, es-

pecially in athletic circles along the

coast. He represented the Vancouver

Athletic Club in various meets for

several years. Besides his parents he

leaves five brothers, Malachi of Morin

Wyoming; Felix of Little Pond, P. E.

I.; George of Prince Rupert; John D.

and Andrew of Georgetown, and three

sisters, Margaret and Sarah of Bos-

ton and Mary of Georgetown.

MAY TRAIN YOUNG WOMEN

FOR BUSINESS POSITIONS

RELEASING MEN FOR WAR

Citizens' Recruiting Committee, at meeting yesterday,

had this plan under consideration—Big recruiting

rally in Imperial Sunday night.

The training of young women for

office work in mercantile establish-

ments and other places to fit them to

take the positions of young men who

might enlist for service in the war,

was a subject which came up for con-

sideration before yesterday afternoon's

meeting of the Citizens' Recruiting

Committee at the recruiting quarters

on Germain street. The advisability

of providing a commercial course for

young women who might be called

upon to assist the Empire by entering

offices was also taken up. It was de-

cided to consult with the school offi-

cials regarding the subject and Doug-

las McArthur and Dr. Emery were ap-

pointed a committee for this purpose.
