The committee appointed to look after the chapter's work in the Military Hospital (Mrs. J. F. Fraser, Mrs. F. A. Peters and Miss Travers), reported that they had filled twelve pairs of knitted socks with gifts for the patients and had supplied greenings and Christmas cards for the ward.

Plans for the meeting of the Provincial Chapter to be held next Tuesday in the Union Club were then brought up. Mrs. Fraser reported having thanked all generous donors to the fund for dinner for the 25th. Over \$1,000 had been raised for Major MacKenzie in aid for Christmas.
