

KAISER'S AMERICA DENTIST TELLS OF GERMANY

EVERY EFFORT BEING MADE TO BELITTLE UNCLE SAM IN GERMAN FATHERLAND

Dr. A. N. Davis States That Idea is Being Fostered That United States is Not in Earnest Concerning the War—Surprised at Freedom of Germans in the Republic—Food Supply Critical in Berlin and Hamburg, But Plenty in Less Congested Districts.

New York, Feb. 28.—The German press is carefully and adroitly continuing to foster the idea among the German people that America is not really in earnest about the war, declared Dr. A. N. Davis today, in discussing the situation in Berlin as he left it, just over a month ago. Dr. Davis, formerly of Piquette, Ohio, is the American dentist who lived in the German capital for fifteen years and numbered Emperor William among his patients.

no restrictions were placed upon them whatever. In Germany every time some new regulation was adopted regarding the Americans, the excuse was given that the United States was treating Germans harshly and there must be some retaliation. German Offensive.

Dr. Davis said a German offensive in the west had been freely talked about in Berlin since last November. The food supply is critical in Berlin and Hamburg, but in the less congested districts all reports say there is comparatively plenty. The difficulties are in many cases those of transportation, and restrictions against transporting food from one province or state into another.

MARITIME UNION FAYORED BY MONCTON CANADIAN CLUB

PUBLIC MEETING IN FAIRVILLE

Strong Protest Against Street Car Service in that Section—Meeting Endorsed Resolutions Adopted at Recent Gathering in the City.

The public meeting held in the Fairville court room to protest against the street car service proposed by the New Brunswick Power Company was largely attended and those present expressed themselves in no uncertain manner as believing that the power company was not carrying out the agreement entered into with the Lancaster Highway Board, when permission was granted them to lay rails in Fairville. The meeting passed a resolution endorsing the resolution adopted at a public meeting held in the Seaman's institute to protest against the proposed increase in rates and appointed a committee to wait on the Power Company and carry out the agreement.

HUMBERT SAYS HE IS INNOCENT

Money with Morgan Firm Was His Own and Sent There to Purchase Paper, He Claims.

Paris, Feb. 28.—Senator Charles Humbert, owner of the Journal, who was arrested last week in connection with the investigation of German propaganda in France, has written to Captain Bouchardon, of the Paris military court, a letter saying that he has been placed in a false light by the cabled despatches from New York regarding funds on deposit to his credit with J. P. Morgan & Company. (An investigation made at the request of the French government by Attorney-General Lewis, of New York State, showed that Senator Humbert had cashed bonds to the value of \$234,000 to his credit). The senator asked a hearing on this subject, engaging to produce complete documentary proofs of his assertions.

SAYS CHURCH DOMINATES

McGill University Registrar Attacks Education System of Quebec and Wants English Official Language.

Montreal, Feb. 28.—The domination of the Roman Catholic church, the voluntary system of education and the payment of school fees were attacked by J. A. Nicholson, registrar of McGill University, in an address to the St. James' Literary Society here tonight, as impediments in the educational system of the province of Quebec. "Not until these evils are done away with will the intelligence of the citizens of this province be raised," he said.

A. M. SAUNDERS SERIOUSLY ILL

Fair Vale (Rothesay), Feb. 28.—The serious illness of Albert M. Saunders has caused much anxiety among his friends—a term which so far as he is concerned includes everybody where he is known—an anxiety which was more than justified today when, after the surgeon had operated upon him in the General Public Hospital in St. John, it was understood that there is but slight hope of his recovery.

THE INDEPENDENCE OF LITHUANIA

Amsterdam, Feb. 27.—Writing in the Berlin Taekische Rundschau, Mathias Ersberger, the clerical chief, says: "For a year past I have advocated the idea that Lithuania should not only be an autonomous, but an independent state in perpetual alliance with Germany. Lithuania desires a series of agreements for the attainment of this object."

CRITICISM OF A "FAT" STORY

Twenty-nine members of the crew, including Junior Lieutenant Edward D. Newell, the commandant of the vessel, were lost when it foundered off the Maryland coast.
