Paris, Jan. 28.—Professor Edouard Branley, inventor of the coherer, which made the practical application of wireless telegraphy possible, is sceptical about wireless messages from Mars. An expression of his opinion was sought in connection with the disclosure by Signor Marconi that mysterious signals, evidently from a great distance, were being received at times by the Marconi instruments.
