London, April 13.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer will introduce the budget next Monday. He will be called upon to make up a deficit of £236,000,000, while the revenue needed amounts to £2,000,000,000. The total letter rate will probably be increased from three pence to two pence, and several important alterations in the income tax will be suggested.
