Mr. George W. Day edits a humorous

paper, and appreciates his own jokes

highly. His election joke cost Mr. De-

Veber a good round sum, \$2,000 per-

haps, and a genuine scare. This was

not a joke of the Liberal party, or of

any party, but Mr. Day's own private

affair. Many went to the polls and

voted for Mr. Day simply because Mr.

DeVeber furnished free coaches, and be-

cause the "inventions" of the "Re-

formers" to win the election excited

amusement. Even bed-ridden invalids

were carried to the polls to vote for

DeVeber! Mr. Day didn't get quite so

many votes in the city as Mr. Ellis did,

but his vote would have exceeded

Ellis's if he had had a regular organ-

ization. Mr. Day's expenses would, we

understand, be \$25,400. This sum is to

be made up for him by one-cent contri-

butions from the concinn and saloon

keepers who profited by Mr. DeVeber's

expenditures.

Mr. John Macdonald's majority of 48

was as large as any one could have ex-

pected. When at the head of the Gov-

ernment, with offices and patronage to

give away, he had only about 150

majority. Suppose fifty of that major-

ity were office-holders and office-seekers

who voted yesterday for the Ministerial

candidate, making a difference of 100 in

the result, not one genuine supporter of

Sir John could have deserted him. We

believe he was voted for by "bodies" who

opposed him at the previous election, as

the official channel, including contractors

and seekers for contracts, must num-

ber more than fifty votes in a city

like Kingston.

Mr. De Cosmos, the gentleman who is

to enter the Cabinet from British Col-

umbia, hearing a rumor of the dissolution

of Parliament, published in his

newspaper on Jan. 7th, an article deny-

ing the rumor and proving that he could

do such an act," he said, "under the

circumstances. The Government stood

pledged to meet Parliament, pass an

election law, and investigate the Pacific

Scandal. A dissolution would put an

end completely to any further investi-

gation. The Premier could not afford

field. The employment of Government

patronage and Ministerial cash for the

Brunswick. Mr. Tupper and Mr. Macdonald

in Nova Scotia, and Sir John A. Macdonald

in Ontario, cannot be explained on any

other grounds than those of a petty

spirit of personal persecution, and a

dread of wholesome criticism in the

House.

One of the outrages committed in On-

tario by hired Ministerial ruffians was

the kidnapping of Mr. Doherty, the Con-

servative candidate for Bedford, on a

charge of insanity. He was seized on

his way home from the house of his

Warden of the County for years, and

the outrage was one of the worst ever

perpetrated in Canada.

St. John editors are not appreciated

at home. Their efforts to get elected

have been, with one exception, disas-

trous. Mr. Anglin and Mr. Day tried

in vain to get into our Common Coun-

cil, and Mr. Anglin had to go to

Gloucester for a Parliamentary constitu-

ency. Mr. Elder was defeated, Mr.

Ellis has been defeated, and now Mr.

Day is defeated. Three defeated editors

in St. John! Now this looks bad for

the profession and bodes no good for

Mr. Willis.

One of the most active of the Govern-

ment canvassers, a gentleman who has

been engaged in every election contest

for several years, says Mr. Burpee's

insidious gain by more unblush-

ing bribery and corruption than was

ever before witnessed in this constitu-

ency. "Now that the excitement of

battle has departed," he says, "I am

ashamed of the part I myself took in

Mr. Burpee's behalf!"

The English Radicals are giving prac-

tical manifestations of their often ex-

pressed desire to see elections conducted

in a free and undisturbed manner by

breaking up Conservative meetings, and

and Dr. Tupper, are increasing in inco-
