Ran over by the Cars.

Herod, Coroner, held an inquest at Tobin's Hotel, Rockwood, on Friday and Saturday last, upon the body of Alexander McFadgeon, of Erin, who was killed on Thursday by being run over by the cars. From the evidence taken at the inquest it appears deseased was the worse of liquor, and started between six and seven o'elock in the evening to walk down the track. The next morning the foreman of the track with his men were going to work, and when about two miles east of Rockwood station they found deceased lying on the side of the track dead. Dr. Perkins made a post mortem examination, and gave it as his opinion that the injury to the ribs, scapula and langs was such that must have been caused from severe violence as would be most likely to occur by a train coming in violent contact with the deceased. The following is the verdict: "From the evidence produced before us we are of opinion that the deceased McFadgeon, came to his death whilst in state of intoxication, from injuries received from a train coming in contact with him while lying or sitting upon the track." Deceased was between 50 and 60 years of age. -Guelph Advertises .
