

A Well, the Union Amicale decided not to strike, and I suppose they were strong enough to run the mill

Q The members of the Union Amicale remained at work, is that right?

A Yes

Q Did any of the men go out at Magog?

A Well, at Magog the loom fixers and the slasher tenders went out first

Q When was that?

A I think it was the eleventh of May

Q On Monday?

A Yes, sir

How many loom fixers and slasher tenders would there be?

A Fifteen

Q Were they followed by any of the others?

A Not at first-- that is to say they stayed out alone all Monday morning, but at noon that same day the weavers complained that they could not work without the loom fixers, and part of them staid out, simply because they had no fixers. The rest of the weavers followed them, and some of the other departments went too, because they saw the weavers out. Then the Company shut down the mill.

Q Do you know when they closed down the mill?

A I think it was the same day

Q The eleventh?

A Yes, I think it was-- that same afternoon. I am not sure of this however.
