Premier King: "I appeal to the young men of Canada to realize their responsibilities to their country; not to criticize, but to realize the problems that have to be met."

"Where nine dollars were spent in the government of the country, only seven dollars are spent today."

"Our national policy is not for one person or party, but for all classes and parties."

Hon. George P. Graham: "We're not afraid of an election at any time, so bring on your guns and let's get started."

#### PROVIDENCE PLAYS PART

"If the farmers are able to produce bountiful crops the country will prosper; if Providence otherwise provides, many will suffer."

"Taxation is not a blessing but a burden. If you tax the farmers, if we load on their shoulders additional burdens, we are making it more difficult for them to produce crops, more costly for them, more costly for us. Instead of retarding industry you be ready to help it grow. As you limit purchases so you create commercial stagnation."

"As women now have the franchise, I ask them to look about in their homes and see the things you need. Why do they cost you so much? Why cannot you secure these articles at a more reasonable price?"

#### HIGH PAY BOOSTS COST

"Industry, which is the transfer of natural products to commodities for human use, answers by paying high wages which in turn increases the cost to you. Our policy is to create a price which will be favorable to all, to those who dwell in the country as well as in the city. If we reduce the cost of machinery and implements of production, we automatically reduce the cost of the food and other items to the consumer. In an undertaking of this nature the government has been thinking first of the home and its needs, and has sought to so shape its finances that it will in time reduce the public debt, increase immigration and make this country prosperous."
